

FORTY-FIFTH DAY.

Legislature Closes the First Half of Its Session.

\$10,000 FOR THE UNIVERSITY.

After Sheep-Killing Days—Resolution against U. S. Senators Brown and Cannon Rejected.

The first half of the ninety-day session of the first Legislature of the State of Utah came to a close today with a very fair showing for the amount of work in progress. Today's proceedings were not marked by anything of a particularly unusual character. The House had a more lively aspect than did the Senate, especially in relation to the Howard resolution, but both were busy on important propositions. The business of the day was as follows:

THE SENATE.

After the opening exercises, House communications were received and announced the presence, without amendment, of S. B. 31, amending the Compiled Laws, and continuing in force the amendment to S. B. 3, the bill law.

Also, announcing that the House had returned to court in the Senate amendments to H. B. 11, providing for neglected wives, and submitting a substitute therefor which had passed the House; the committee was referred to the committee on judiciary.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Committee of the committee on judiciary, reported on H. B. 35, relating to damages by grading streets, that a substitute had been framed; the passage of the substitute was recommended.

AGAINST SHEEP-KILLING DAYS. R. G. Miller introduced S. B. 36, to provide for the recovery of damages for sheep killed by dogs, related to the committee on judiciary.

UNIVERSITY APPROPRIATION. S. B. 16, making an appropriation of \$10,000 for the University of Utah, was taken up on third reading.

On motion of Chandler the amount was changed to \$10,000.

With this and some minor amendments, the bill passed and was referred to the House for action.

WORLD'S FAIR REPORT. A communication from the Governor announced the receipt of the report of the Utah World's Fair commission, in printed form. Copies had been distributed to the members.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS. S. B. 18, providing for a state board of examiners and presiding officers thereof, was taken up on third reading. The bill was amended, and passed by a vote of 11 to 9.

LIBRARIES AND READING ROOMS. R. B. 38, allowing cities to provide for free public libraries and reading rooms, was taken up on third reading. Chandler wanted the term of directors reduced to four years, and the committee of directors limited to four; his amendment to that effect received only his vote.

The bill was amended in color words and passed by a vote of 15 to 1. Evans voting no.

MAXYON'S VETO POWER. S. B. 54, authorizing maxyons to veto specific items in appropriation bills of city councils, came up on third reading. A. I. was passed by unanimous vote.

UNIVERSITY OF UTAH BILLS. S. B. 37, providing for the organization, support and maintenance of the University of Utah, and revealing all laws on the subject, came up on third reading, and was being considered when the Senate went to press. The bill is a continuation of the existing statutes on the subject.

THE HOUSE.

After the New went to press yesterday afternoon the following business was transacted.

The following bills were read first and second times: Senate bill 72, relating to election of representatives in Congress; House bill 74, providing for the power and duties of the Governor and fixing his salary; Senate bill 60, providing for the removal of officers otherwise than by impeachment; Senate bill 61, amending Utah laws relating to witnesses; Senate bill 70, providing for the transfer of property belonging to the school for the deaf and dumb; Senate bill 71, to amend Utah laws relating to exemptions from levy and sale on execution. The bills were read on the following committee: Election, Judiciary, Judiciary, Judiciary, Judiciary, Judiciary.

Communications from the Governor announced that his excellency had signed Senate bill 54 and House bill 14.

Senate bill 51, to amend Utah laws relating to the duties of county prosecuting attorneys, was read third time and passed.

The House adjourned at 4:45 p. m.

Today's Session.

The journal of yesterday's proceedings was approved, and a communication was received from the Senate, announcing the passage of House bill 101.

PETITIONS AND CLAIMS.

House petition 41 was presented by Mr. Hester and came from residents of Peterson, Morgan county, asking for the passage of Senate bill 25, on election.

House petition 42 was presented by Mr. Thorne, by request, and was from Robert Hill, of Panguitch, asking redress in the sum of \$2,000 for loss of property by reason of the action of the board of supervisors of Garfield county, appointed by the legislative assembly of 1935, in ejecting him from certain lands in Panguitch.

House claim 85, by Mr. Harris, was from M. H. Thomas, of Ogden, for \$3.45 for jury service.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The Judiciary committee reported amendments to House bill 29, giving probate power to district judges. The amendments were accepted and the report adopted.

The labor committee recommended the rejection of House bill 7, establishing

the free employment office and appropriating for their maintenance. The recommendation of the committee was made from a desire to not increase the State expenses. The report was adopted.

The same committee recommended the nonpassage of House bill 43, protecting employees from discrimination in certain cases, and the recommendation was adopted.

The municipal corporations committee reported a substitute for House bill 29, providing that a town or city of this state having an assessed value of \$10,000 or over may elect to the valuation for any purpose, in addition to existing municipalities, and providing for the manner of submission and issuance of such bonds. The substitute report was accepted.

Mr. Howard moved a resolution that the House report on House bill 43 be adopted, and that consideration of the report be postponed until tomorrow, and the motion prevailed.

AN OBSCURANTER RESOLUTION.

House concurrent resolution 1 was introduced by Mr. Howard. As soon as the House of the resolution had been read and the names of "Frank J. Cannon" and "Arthur Brown" were reached, Mr. Critchlow objected to the reading of the resolution. The speaker was undecided as to the action of the House on the resolution.

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Today was closed by Senator R. G. Miller. He spoke to the point, some with an vain repetition.

The Senate bill relating to public libraries in cities provides for the election of six directors for six years, two being elected every two years.

The passage by the Senate of the State board of examiners bill kills the State printer bill which was recommended to the printing committee.

The joint labor committee had another meeting. Its members were not yet unanimous in their opinion of the best way to provide a State land board.

The substitute for Senator Glen Miller's state land bill was only substantially the same in effect as the original bill, only the language is in more concise form.

The attempt to introduce in the House a resolution to amend the Utah Constitution by adding the words "and Cannon" for their vote on the tariff bill has created quite a breeze on both sides of the political fence.

The ex-convict warrants bill will come up again on Monday next. It is probable that it will receive such consideration as to remove the main obstacle to its passage.

The bill to amend the charter of the U. S. A. and U. S. money and place the same under a board of agriculture is still in the hands of the committee, since the design is not clear for the State's welfare.

The Constitution directs the State Legislature to create a set of officers, but the first Legislature is not required to do so. The Constitution does not provide for all time, and some of the officers it names will not be needed in the State for twenty years.

Prof. Wm. M. Stewart and Vice President J. T. Knapman were speakers at the Senate proceedings this afternoon. The session of their presence was interesting to the Utah people, especially among the students, in which, as members of the faculty, they are concerned.

When H. B. 38, relating to public libraries and reading rooms, was read to the Senate today, the words of the reader were so rapid and indistinct that not a legislator listening could have told what the provisions of the bill were, but it was a good thing that the printed copies that had been provided.

Senator R. G. Miller's bill for an act relating to the recovery of damages for sheep killed by dogs provided that any person who or who is guilty of doing so shall be liable to the owner of the sheep killed by the dog, and shall not be necessary to prove that the dog was accustomed to kill sheep, or that he knew that fact, in order to recover damages.

The vote of the Governor and other members of the Reform school board and several legislators in Ogden yesterday resulted in the adoption of a school policy which about \$50 per month will be saved to the State.
