HAS SUNSHINE IN HER VOICE.

Blauvelt a Singer Who Dispels the Clouds and Scatters Seeds Of Cheer.

A MOST BRILLIANT ARTIST

She is Desirous of Giving a Concert in Salt Lake on Her Return From the Coast Early in March.

Resplendent with rare and costly jewels, decorated with the insignias of royal favor, and possessing a charming personality and voice of high dramatic quality, Mme. Lillian Blauvelt, the noted American soprano, last night gave the people of Ogden a concert that must stand conspicuous among the musical events of the city for years to come. The program was ideal as to length, occupying but an hour and a quarter in its rendition, including the numbers by the choir, under the direction of Prof. Ballantyne. The reper-toire covered German, French, Italian and English compositions and was no-table for its brilliance. From the first notes of the opening song, "Die Lotus-blume," by Shuman, to the "Inflamma-tus" finale, with the choir, by Rossini, the fair artist mastered any swayed her audience at will, except when it erst all bounds and applauded her to

Her "Guten Morgen" (Good Morning) song was as daintily and exquisitely colored as the tints of a western rainow, and brought forth a perfect storm of enthusiasm which was rewarded with a nameless encore gem that scintilated and shone in an atmosphere now now radiant with musical delight. Then "Will Niemand Singen" audience experienced another thrill such as only an artist of the Blauvelt standard can produce. An-other encore was demanded with an emphasis unmistakable, but a program lection was given instead, and superb indeed was the presentation. It was "Cavatine" from the "Barber of Serille." This time the distinguished artist gracefully yielded to the call for return and gave a heart song that wiched responsive chords in every breast, and started another reverberating wave of approval through the au-

It was now time for the Tabernacle choir to contribute its quota to the musical feast; and right well did it per form its part. Gounod's "Unfold Ys was the selection. That the audience was pleased was manifest in the applause that ensued. Conductor Ballantyne has some excellent voice timber in the organization and apparently makes the best use of it, but how badly he needs a new organ! The instrument may have been a good one in the long ago, but like a superanuated watch it needs replacing by a new one. When Mme. Blauvelt returned from her dressing room she received a most royal greeting and gave Verdi's beauti-ful "Sicilian Vespers" in notes so clear. so pure, in style so captivating that the whole choir wanted to embrace her, and her auditors looked on in demon-strative approval while she was combow her acknowledgements times without number. As a tribute of appreciation for this reception there was another heart song, scores of which she has within easy reach for occa-sions like this. "The Soldier's Chorus" by the choir was capably given at this fincture but its effectiveness was broken ground by the organ. Prof. Ballantyne winced, his singers squirmed, the audience gave him its sympathy and the incident closed.
