

ODD FELLOWS WIND UP THEIR SESSION TODAY

Grand Lodge Holds Optimistic Reports from All Parts of the State—Salt Lake Gets Prize.

The grand lodge of Odd Fellows is completing its thirty-fifth annual session this afternoon in Odd Fellows hall. Among the first business transacted in the session was the formal announcement of a new lodge at Ogden. The lodge throughout the state were reported to be in a healthy condition, with excellent prospects in view. Fifty members received past official and grand lodge degrees.

During yesterday afternoon's session the matter of a widow and orphan fund and home, which would centralize the work now being done by the individual lodges, was discussed, but was continued over until the next meeting. At 5 o'clock the annual street parade was held, in procession including the grand lodge, patriotic militia, clarinet, Bingham, Provo, Fidelity, Enterprise, Jordan, Salt Lake and Utah lodges. Refreshments, grand lodge officers, grand encampment officers, and veteran Odd Fellows who have been members for over 25 years. 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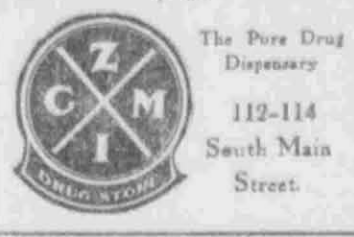

The parents after much persuasion induced the girl to return to Hunter with her companion that she might be talked over. Before finding their child the parents had called upon the police asking them to interfere, but aid was denied them for the reason that the law does not permit their intrusion into such affairs. RAILROAD NEWS

THINKS TAFT IS SAME President Elder of Santa Fe Considering Many Improvements.

San Francisco, April 21.—E. P. Ruppel, president of the Santa Fe railroad, who arrived at Salt Lake yesterday afternoon, will make a tour of inspection over the Northwestern Pacific to determine whether or not it is complete that line. In addition to the building of a new line between Ogden and Shively, it is construction of a line from Ogden to the coast to headland in use of the railway which will be discussed at a conference today.

According to the estimates furnished Ruppel by his engineers it would cost \$2,000,000 to construct the line. It is a good deal to risk in railroad building in view of the attacks that have been made on the railroads in the last few years," he said. "What do I look of the situation at present? TO INSPECT CUT-OFF.

Consulting Engineer Isaacs Will Arrive in Ogden Thursday.

Ogden, April 21.—Consulting Engineer John D. Isaacs of the Hawaiian system, with headquarters at Chicago, will arrive in Ogden Thursday morning to inspect the great number of improvements that are being made in this city by the railroad company. One of the principal places to be visited will be the Ogden-Latin cut-off across Great Salt Lake, and for which the sum of \$1,000,000 has been appropriated for the building of a break water to protect the trestle work. While in the city, Mr. Isaacs will inspect the site for the proposed freight depot and foundry as well as the viaduct which is rapidly nearing completion.

MILE A MINUTE FROM OGDEN.

Light-shaped, with a flat bottom and round wheels and invisible steps, one of the new types of gasoline trolley motor cars to be used on the Los Angeles and San Diego Beach railroads, built by the Salt Lake trolley car company, is being driven from Ogden with its own power. The motor made the distance from the Junction City in 26 minutes, which is a mile a minute fast. The car is made to make speed, and the front end comes to a point in order to offer as little resistance to the atmosphere through which it passes as possible. Entrance to the car is from the side. It was made by the McKee Car company of Omaha. The trip to Los Angeles was continued this morning on the tracks of the Salt Lake Route.
