OBITUARY.

DODGE—Marion Wallace Clark, the beloved wife of August E. Dodge, died on the 21st day of November, A. D. 1886, after three months of sickness, disease of the kidneys and liver. Sister Clark was born on the 22d day of November, 1823, in Essex County, Vermont; was baptized into the Church by Elder Orson Pratt in the year 1835. Arrived in Salt Lake Valley in the fall of 1849. In the fall of 1850 she was married to A. E. Dodge and moved to Manti, Sanpete County. In 1861 was called to Dixie on a mission, where she remained until her death. She was the mother of nine children, six of whom are living, three boys and three girls. She was a faithful wife and a good Latter-day Saint.—Com.

PERKINS.—Died 16th November, 1886, in St. George, Washington County, Utah, William G. Perkins. He was the son of Ute Perkins and Sarah Gant Perkins; was born in South Carolina, January 11th, 1801; his father moved to Tennessee in 1835, and Wm. G. Perkins lived there until 1829. He married Dicy Ray the 22d of February, 1818, by whom he had a son and a daughter. He moved to Hancock County, Illinois, in 1829, and in 1838 was baptized by Joel H. Johnson, and was ordained a Teacher. He was ordained a High Priest under the hands of Hyrum Smith in 1843, and set apart under the hands of Presidents Brigham Young and H. C. Kimball to act as Bishop in Macedonia. He took a mission with Andrew Perkins to the southern part of Illinois in 1843, and in 1846 received his endowment, started west with his family, remained at Council Bluffs two years, in 1848 came to Salt Lake City, and was made Bishop of the Seventh Ward, May, 1853, he married Hannah Gold, and in 1851 was called on a mission to St. George; on the 23rd of March, 1852, he was set apart as Counselor to William Fawcett, President of the High Priests' Quorum of the St. George Stake, and acted in that capacity over 24 years, or until his death. He was ordained a Patriarch under the hands of Presidents Brigham Young and G. A. Smith, Apostles Erastus Snow and Brigham Young, Jun., and Joseph W. Young, President of the Southern Mission Stake of Zion, on the 27th of March, 1870. The funeral services were held in the Tabernacle at St. George, on the 17th of November, 1886, at 2 p. m. Wm. Fawcett, President of the High Priests' Quorum of the St. George Stake, spoke, and also the Presidency of the Stake, Bishop David H. Cannon and High Counselor Charles Smith. A large number of attendants and vehicles escorted him to the grave.

CAMPBELL.—At North Ogden, November 24th, 1886, Jonathan Campbell. Was born in the State of Massachusetts, about the year 1805 or 1806. Was married in his 22d year, of which marriage five children were born to him. In the year 1839 or 1840, he was baptized into the Church by his brother, Benjamin Campbell. Gathered with the Saints to Nauvoo in the early part of the year 1844, previous to the death of the Prophet Joseph; stayed at Nauvoo and labored on the Temple. At the time the Saints were expelled he and his family were driven across the river; underwent many hardships and finally arrived at Winter Quarters. When Captain Allen came to Council Bluffs to get four or five companies of men to go Mexico, Brother Campbell enlisted in the Mormon Battalion, on the 16th of July, 1846, and left with the camp of the Saints, all that was near and dear to him, a loving wife and three small children. His wife he never saw again, as she died at the Bluffs, having endured so many hardships and trials that she could endure no more. Her three little children were brought to Salt Lake valley with the Pioneers. Brother Campbell went through with the Pioneers to California, there got an honorable discharge. Came to Salt Lake valley by the Southern route from Los Angeles in 1848; lived in Salt Lake City till the fall of 1850, when he moved up to Ogden with his wife and children (he having married a Sister Lucinda Shipman), and wintered at what is known as Farr's Fort. In the spring of 1851 he located and helped to settle what is now North Ogden, where he has lived ever since, having labored as a Teacher all of this time, except the last two years of his life, when he was too feeble to perform that duty. He died as he had lived—a faithful, true Latter-day Saint.

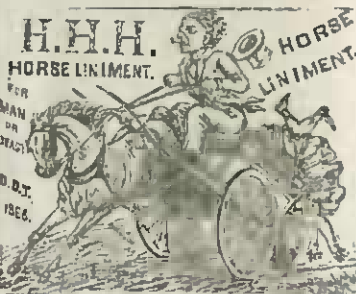
