May, 1823, he married Hannah Gold, and fa 1861 was called on a mission to St. George; on the 23rd of March, 1862, he was set apart as Counselor to William Fawcett, President of the High Priests' Quorum of the St. George Stake, and acted in that capacity over 24 years, or until his death. — was ordained a Patrared under the hands of Presidents Brigham Young and G.
