strenuous efforts five other stacks in the same field were saved.

The persons who are injured are: David Holman and Frank Openshaw, badly scalded about the face, breast and arms, besides having a number of cuts on various parts of their bodies.

Isaac Dana and Dudley S. Lewis, also scalded about the face, arms and breast, and bruised; their injuries are not dangerous.

John F. Lewis, scalded on right side and thigh; not seriously hurt. Henry M. Lewis, bruised about the head, and severely shaken up. Wallace A.McDonald was thrown about 20. fort and out and bruised about 30 feet and cut and bruised

W. Fellows and two boys, Elijah W. Fellows and two boys, Elijah Allen and Ellis Johnson, were also burned and bruised slightly.

Following is the order made by the Territorial Supreme Court in regard to the leasing of the Church sheap sheep:

In this cause it is ordered that the receiver advertise in three daily

papers published in this city and the Ogden Standard and Commercial published in Ogden, and in one paper published at Provo, Beav-er and Nephi, for sealed pro-posals for the leasing of the sheep seized by him, such adver-tisement to be made at once and continued for at least three weeks, and that in such advertisement the receiver ask for bids for such sheep, stating the number approxi-mately to be leased, such proposal to be under seal, and to state the number of sheep for the price to be paid per head, the leases to com-mence on the 1st of September, 1889, and terminate one year thereafter, the sheep to be returned at that time to be equal in number, quality and condition to those received, all losses and accidents to be at the risk of the lessee, and that such proposal state sureties proposed and all other necessary information; that such bids be required to be delivered to the chie ustice of this court on or before the 15th day of August, 1889.
