A NEW INVENTION.—A wonderful printing machine is in progress, if not completed, in this city. The invention is designed to make one hundred types of any font answer to indent and make a mould, from which a stereotype cast can be obtained, equally as perfect as those formerly obtained from a form of type set in the usual way. These types (of two alphabets, figures, punctuation marks and combination words) are placed in a type-head, in a machine operated by keys, and made to imprint and indent a mould one hundred impressions per minute, from which a stereotype cast can be obtained in five minutes, of uniform thickness, ready for the press, or they can be printed with ink on paper and transferred to a zinc plate, and printed by a recently invented lithographic press, two thousand five hundred impressions an hour. Every style of type, borders, ornamentation, and also music, can be produced, requiring only one type of each character. Justification and corrections can be made without the loss of any more time than the same amount of matter would take the usual way, and as many as fifty different styles of type can be used by the compositor, without rising from his seat (at the machine). The machine dispenses with founts of type and cases, setting, distributing, and seven-eighths of the labor of the composing room. The machine is driven like a sewing-machine, and occupies no more space. It can be manufactured for not over two hundred dollars each. A full-size, practical working machine, illustrating all that is claimed for the invention, can be seen at 444 Broome street. M. Nelson is the inventor of the machine. —N. Y. Express.

An English paper says: At a meeting of the Society of Arts on December 21, Sir Antonio Brady in the chair, a paper was read by Mr. Siber on the method of lighting towns, factories, and private houses by vegetable or mineral oils. The system proposed is to distribute the oil over the house in pipes, like water, from a general reservoir containing a few gallons at the top of the building. The flow is regulated by little cisterns, provided with a novel and well constructed tap, regulated by a ball-cock or self-acting float, the lights being as nearly as possible on a level with the distributing cisterns. When the lamp is lighted the oil is by the ball-cock movement supplied automatically as fast to the wick as it is consumed, and a very perfect combustion is effected. Numerous lights, of excellent quality and steadiness, were kept burning in the lecture-room during the evening; and in the long and earnest discussion which followed, there was a general concurrence in admitting the great advance which has been made in this mode of burning light petroleum oils. There was none of the unpleasant odor so common in all the previous mineral oil lamps.

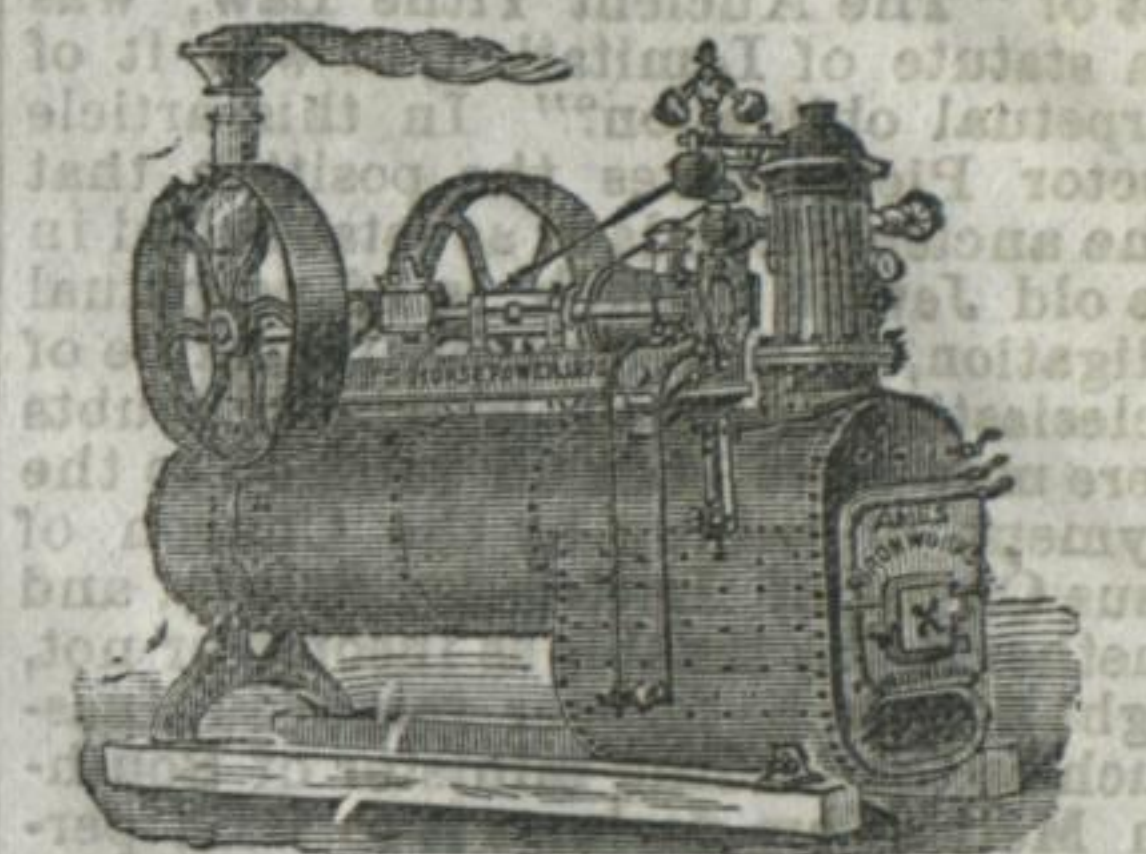
