

LATTER-DAY SAINTS COLLEGE.

Dedictory Exercises in the New Quarters Last Thursday.

On Thursday, the 6th inst., the opening session of the Latter-day Saints College in the new quarters, was held, commencing at 10 a. m.

In addition to the teachers and pupils there were among those present Captain Willard Young, of the General Board of Education, President Angus M. Cannon, Vice-President Elias Morris, and Elder H. W. Nahl, of the Stake Board, Choroni, Joseph E. Taylor, Elder Geo. H. Watson and others.

The dedicatory exercises were of an impressive character.

The pupils sang a hymn. This was followed by a few remarks by the principal, Dr. J. H. Thomson, on the duties of the students, and the uses of the different parts of the building.

Captain Willard Young made reference to the completion of the educational system of the Church, the numerous facilities offered for the training of the young, and compared the same with a proper appreciation of those not mentioned by the speaker. Quotations of the Priesthood, Sunday Schools, Improvement Associations, etc., in addition to the Christian school organizations, are provided for the use of young Latter-day Saints. It was said that the aim was to have the youth of the Church advanced in the knowledge of the principles of the Gospel, and to have them ready to take up the cross at any moment.

President H. W. Nahl, referred to this as one of the happiest events of his life. The Board of Education carefully felt for their personal sacrifices in providing new quarters for the school by seeing to it that the young gathered together in brotherly love. It had long been his desire to see the young among the Latter-day Saints advanced toward higher education, and he hoped to see the day when this people would lead on in this direction.

The dedicatory of the College must be of the highest order, and he hoped that the youth of the Church would be growing up to be patriots to the land. Hence the necessity of careful education and preparation of the youth.

Vice-President Elias Morris joined in the congratulatory remarks for the building of a house for the College. Although small, and not what could be desired in the way of a large building, it will serve as a nucleus, where something better may grow. The main building will be erected and beyond that others would be approached.

President Angus M. Cannon dealt with the personal advancement of youth by the members of the board, and stated that they had involved themselves in a considerable amount of personal financial credit, but were willing to do so for the sake of the youth. He hoped that the school would continue to prosper.

The spirit of God has been manifesting itself among the youth, and he hoped that the regular work of the school was progressing.

The new location of the college is No. 237 W. First North street. The grounds have a north frontage of 12 rods by 25 rods depth, and an attractive lawn extends from the street to the building, which is provided with two main entrances. The Normal and Academic departments occupy rooms on the first floor, as do also the Principal's office and laboratory, the library and the dining room.

The laboratory is fitted with almost all needed apparatus, such as gas, water, electrical conveniences, hood, apparatus, etc., and in addition to this has mounted apparatus previously furnished, some of which has been newly provided. Electrostatic belts, reading all parts of the human eye connected with the office clock and ring every half hour as a signal for change of classes.

On the second floor are situated the three sitting rooms of the Laboratory Department, and also, as additional convenience is formed by opening living doors and throwing the two large rooms into one.

The building is heated by steam and lighted by gas and electricity. All the rooms are well ventilated, and excellent windows are provided for giving light. Outside the main building is a separate laboratory, built of brick, and provided with a cement floor. This laboratory has all conveniences in the shape of water, gas, books, etc.

The officers of the college are: Director of studies, all from the students of the college, and the young should take advantage of the few years that are vacant. We wish the institution every possible success.
