APPALING DISASTER.

SEVEN YOUNG PEOPLE DROWNED IN A SANPETE LAKE.

SEBASTIAN, Sanpete County, June 24th.

Editors Deseret News:

Yesterday a party of young people, from this place and Mayfield, made an excursion to what is known as Funch's Lake, about six miles south of Mant. On the lake was a boat, in which the excursionists took pleasure trips across the water. About one o'clock, while the boat was in the middle of the lake, a terrific gale swept over it, causing a panic among those on board. Most of them rushed to the bow, sinking and capsizing the boat. Five from Ephraim and six from Mayfield were drowned. They were between the ages of 8 and 23. Only two were saved, by clinging to the boat. The greatest exertions were made to save the parties from drowning, by men taking poles and slabs and, at the risk of their own lives, venturing out on the lake, but all in vain. About two hours after the disaster the wind subsided sufficiently for men to take the boat and search for the bodies, which they found within a few feet of one another. By five o'clock all the bodies were recovered. This sad accident has cast the deepest gloom over the whole community.

Of Ephraim.—Chas. Christensen, aged 19; Miss Anderson, daughter of Lars Anderson, aged 16; Miss Bella Thompson, aged 11 years; Miss Anderson, daughter of Jens Anderson, aged 11; Master Larsen, aged 9 years.
