ST. GEORGE.—Bro. Jos. W. Young writes
from St. George, on the 7th instants:
"President Snow's health is poor. He
has kept his room for about four weeks,
but we hope to see him out again before
long."
"Our brethren from the Muddy have
nearly passed through this city on their
way to Long Valley. A few have returned
to their old homes in the north. They
were suffered severely in their retreat by
severe snow storms on the mountains be-
tween here and the Beaver dams, but are
now here and the people of this city,
Washington, and Santa Clara have done
nobly in sending teams and men to their
assistance."
"Our winter has been severe, but Spring
is putting in an appearance, and in about
two weeks St. George will be in full bloom."
"The monies have had a general run
through our settlements, and many chil-
dren have died from the effects of the
cholerae disease. There is at present a
kind of distemper among the people, in
fact we are having a sickly time. I hope
you are better in Salt Lake City."

DESERET ENGINE AND HOOD AND LAD-
DER COMPANY.—The following report was
handed in on Wednesday afternoon for
publication in yesterday's NEWS, but was
forgotten until too late. It therefore ap-
pears to-day:

"The third meeting of the Deseret En-
gine Co. No. 1, and James Hook and Lad-
der Co. No. 1, met in joint session in the
City Hall, last Tuesday evening, when by-
laws were adopted, and the kind of uni-
form, badges, etc. to be worn by the com-
pany was discussed, when the meeting
adjourned until Saturday evening, April
1, at half past seven o'clock."
The above companies were formed
four weeks ago, under the direction of
Chief Engineer John D. T. McAllister,
when the following officers were chosen:
Engine Co. No. 1, Foreman,
Charles H. Crow; Assistant Foreman, John
Headland; Secretary, John W. Shaver; Treas-
urer, Wm. J. Hooper; Steward, Charles
M. Donohue, Secy.

Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1, Foreman,
Henry Dinwiddie; Assistant Foreman,
George Taylor; Secretary, Joseph A. Tay-
lor; Treasurer, Wm. L. Binger; Steward,
Alexander Bink.

An engine is being built by J. Isaacson,
of this city, and will be ready by the mid-
dle of next month. It will be eight feet
long, two cylinders, six inch bore, eight
inch stroke, large enough to employ twenty
hands, plane-shaped box and will weigh
about 1,500 pounds. There will be
twenty-five inch wheels, and thirty-one
inch, high.

The tracks, leaders and apparatus for the
use of the Hook and Ladder Co. are being
negotiated for. The City Council have in
contemplation the erection of a fire house
as an addition to the old City Hall, which
will give room below for the engine and
apparatus of both companies.
