COTTONWOOD TELEGRAPH. The following telegram was received this morning: ROCK QUARRY, Little Cottonwood, March 18th 1877.

Editor Desert News. We expect to open a Telegraph office in Cottonwood about noon, at Centre City, Cottonwood mines. A. M. MURPHY.

The following was received this afternoon: "The telegraph office at Little Cottonwood Mines is now open for business."

ST. GEORGE. Bro. Jos. W. Young writes from St. George, on the 7th instants: "President Snow's health is poor. He has kept his room for about four weeks, but we hope to see him out again before long."

"Our brethren from the Muddy have mostly passed through this city on their way to Long Valley. A few have returned to their old homes in the north. They have suffered severely in their retreat by severe snow storms on the mountains but have been here and the Beaver dam but we have no perished. The people of this city, Washington, and Santa Clara have done nobly in sending teams and men to their assistance."

"Our winter has been severe, but Spring is putting in an appearance, and in about two weeks St. George will be in full bloom."

"The measles have had a general run through our settlements, and many children have died from the effects of the contagious disease. There is at present a kind of distemper among the people, in fact we are having a sickly time. I hope you are better in Salt Lake City."

DESERT ENGINE AND HOOD AND LADDER COMPANY. The following report was handed in on Wednesday afternoon for publication in yesterday's NEWS, but was forgotten until too late. It therefore appears to-day:

"The third meeting of the Desert Engine Co. No. 1, and Ladder and Hoop and Ladder Co. No. 1, was in joint session in the City Hall, last Tuesday evening, when by-laws were adopted, and the kind of machinery to be used in the engine was discussed, when the meeting adjourned until Saturday evening, April 1, at half past seven o'clock."

The above companies were formed four weeks ago, under the direction of Chief Engineer John D. T. Headlister, when the following gentlemen were elected: Engine Co. No. 1, Foreman, Charles H. Crow; Assistant Foreman, John Headlister; Secretary, John W. Shaver; Treasurer, Wm. J. Hooper; Steward, John M. Donaghy, Secy.

Ladder and Hoop and Ladder Co. No. 1, Foreman, Henry D. Woodley; Assistant Foreman, George Taylor; Secretary, Joseph E. Taylor; Treasurer, Wm. L. Binder; Steward, Alexander Beck.

An engine is being built by J. Isaacson, of this city, and will be ready by the middle of next month. It will be eight feet long, two cylinders, six inch bore, eight inch stroke, large enough to employ twenty hands, piano-shaped box and will weigh about 1,200 pounds and will run twenty-five inches high, when thirty-one inches high.

The trucks, ladders and apparatus for the use of the Hoop and Ladder Co. are being negotiated for. The City Council have in consideration the erection of a new tank as an addition to the old City tank, which will give room below for the engine and apparatus of both companies.
