

GOOD NEWS COMES TO THE SHEEPMEN Woolgrowers' Representatives at The Hub Say Storage Plan a Success.

TO SELL NOW IS TO LOSE. Pessimistic Tone Pervades the Textile World and the Reason is Given From Eastern Points.

"Success is already ours," say the officials of the Utah Wool Growers' association, an organization whose first act was to start a movement for better wool prices.

MAX STORE ENTIRE CLIP. The officers are confident nearly every pound of Utah wool will be sent to Boston for storage under the arrangements described.

Strictly authentic reports from the east are not so rosy, however. The opinion voiced among the best posted men and magazines is that there is no improvement to report in any part of the wool market.

DEMAND IS LACKING. Dispatches from New York say "Demand has been at an unusual quantity in foreign markets during the last few days."

From another source comes the explanation that the general softness of seaboard markets is causing dealers to move with utmost caution.

HOPE IN THE FUTURE. With these conditions reported in home and foreign markets and with but 50 per cent of the mills ready in operation, the west decided early that to sell now would be to give wool away.

The dealers are fast becoming convinced that the time is at hand to call a halt on price cutting, says the American Wool and Cotton Reporter.

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SEEKS LARGE SUM FOR BAD INJURIES

J. W. Boedecker of Pueblo Says He Was Hurt Through Carelessness.

ASKS JUDGMENT FOR \$25,000.

Ohio Copper Company and Minnesota Steel and Machinery Company Are Named as Defendants.

J. W. Boedecker of Pueblo, Colo., this morning, through his attorneys, Powers & Martineaux, filed suit in the Third district court against the Ohio Copper company and the Minnesota Steel & Machinery company for \$25,000 damages.

The complaint alleges that while the plaintiff was at work, during the construction of a concentrator by the companies named at Bingham on the 23rd day of September, 1907, the companies, by the negligence of its employees and engineer, moved without warning a large steel girder which was lodged between two columns and which plaintiff was trying to dislodge, precipitating the plaintiff to the ground and injuring him by fracturing his skull, breaking his collar bone, breaking the ligaments of his ribs, bruising and tearing his left side, and left arm, spraining and wrenching his back, joints and spine.

NEW INCORPORATIONS. Articles of incorporation of the Nevada Loan & Trust company were filed with the secretary of state today.

FURROW BOUND OVER. In Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith's court this morning, an order was made binding over to the district court one William Furrow, charged with criminal violation of the law by selling liquor to a woman in violation of the prohibition law.

Atty. Bert Olson is representing the defense. The entire morning session was taken up in the fruitless attempt to establish the identity of the accused. Half a dozen Greeks were called in to identify the prisoners but none of them were able to do so.
