Mr. Aldrich continued: "One of the most important ques-tions with which the commission has had to deal is us to what weight should be given the fact that other countries have with unan mily adopted certain policies with reference to banking and monetary affairs, and how far this un-formity of experience and action should be influentiat in the preparation of a plain for our country. We cannot afford to ignore foreign experience. "We are not able at this time to put into definite form the character of a credit organization we think desirable for the United States; but we can agree

for the United States: but we can agree upon certain matters and provisions that must be granded against or elim-inated from any possible scheme.

TENTATIVE PLANS.

"First, it would be impossible to es-tablish any credit organisations that would interfere with or control the ex-isting banks, or whose resources or credit could be used for speculative purposes; or that could possibly be deminated by the financial men or in-citutions in one section of the country. We have many financial centers of varying importance in the Unifed varying importance in the Unifed States between whom natural dvalfier exist, and whatever form our organiza-tion might take. It is necessary to guard against giving to one banking community any advantage over an-other.

'Second, it is of equal, if not greater "Second, it is of equal, if not greater importance to adopt some of the more important features of systems that have been successful in other countries.
