DEMOCRATS NOMINATE MUNICIPAL TICKET

Mayor Brewer Nominated to Succeed
Himself—Unanimity Marks Sat-
urday's Convention.

OGDEN, Oct. 11.—The work of the
city Democratic convention was com-
pleted Saturday night by the nomi-
nation of the following city ticket:
Mayor—Alexander L. Brewer.
Recorder—George Shorten.
Auditor—Mrs. Orson Blaser.
Treasurer—W. F. Toller.
Attorney—J. D. Skeen.
There was considerable enthusiasm
shown at the proceedings, and all the
nominations were made by acclamation.
During a strong unanimity of feeling
among the Democrats of the city,
Chairman Charles H. Smithworth and
J. D. Skeen, nominee for attorney,
the following announcements of the
members of the central committee
were made from each ward and rat-
ified: First ward, T. F. Emmett; Sec-
ond ward, C. J. Humphrey; Third ward,
James Harris; Fourth ward, Joseph
Carr; Fifth ward, George Lockhead.

JOHN A. GIBBS SUCCUMBS TO INJURIES

OGDEN, Oct. 11.—John A. Gibbs, age
22, died at the family residence on
Barryville avenue yesterday morning
at 11 o'clock as the result of injuries
sustained last Wednesday while as-
sisting a neighbor in building a barn.
Mr. Gibbs lost his balance and fell,
breaking a leg and receiving internal
injuries of a serious nature. This is
the third accidental death in the family
in five years. A brother was injured
by a horse about five years ago and
died from the accident; the father met
his death while assisting in building a
barn, the structure collapsing with
him, about three years ago. The de-
ceased leaves a sorrowing mother and
several brothers and sisters. He was
a very popular young man in the com-
munity and leaves a host of friends to
mourn his death. The body is being
cared for by Larkin & Sons undertak-
ing establishment. Funeral announce-
ment will be made later.

HORSETHIEF IN THE TOILS.

REFUGILIANS NAME MUNICIPAL TICKET

Citizens or Independents Will Make
It a Three Corned Fight
In Provo.

(Special Correspondence.)
PROVO, Oct. 11.—The following are
the names for officers of Provo City
selected by the Republican city con-
vention Saturday afternoon:
For Mayor—S. P. Eggersten.
For Recorder—John Saxe.
For Treasurer—Mrs. Elizabeth E.
Choules.
For Attorney—A. L. Booth.
For Justice of the Peace—George A.
Startup.

The committee on platform reported
a platform plank pledging the proper
support of all ordinances for prohibi-
tion and the enactment of other pro-
hibition ordinances, if those enacted
are not sufficient. A minority report
was presented by Ephraim Homer. The
minority report favored licensing saloons
with provision that card
tables, pool tables, etc., be not permitted
in saloons. Mr. Homer and Mr. E. A.
Mitchell spoke at length in favor of
the minority report. A. L. Booth
spoke in favor of the majority report.
The minority report was defeated, and
the report of the committee adopted
by a big majority.

The following were placed in nomi-
nation for mayor: Simon P. Eggersten
and Joseph S. Berry. Eggersten received
80 votes, and Berry 50 votes. The
vote was then made unanimous.
For city recorder John Saxe was
nominated by acclamation, as was
Elizabeth E. Choules (the present in-
cumbent) for city treasurer.
D. H. Thomas and A. L. Booth were
placed in nomination for city attor-
ney. Booth received 103 votes and
Thomas, 29.
For justice of the peace, George A.
Startup and A. A. Noon were placed in
nomination. Startup received 66 and
Noon 46 votes on the first ballot. On
the second ballot Startup received 68
votes and Noon 61.
J. M. Jensen was elected city chair-
man, and the members of the city com-
mittee named at the primaries were
ratified.

CITIZENS' MOVEMENT.

PROVO, Oct. 11.—It is evident that
some of the people of Provo are not in
sympathy with the action taken by
the Republican and Democratic parties
in convention here last week, and as
a result of the dissatisfaction a mass
meeting was held yesterday in the K.
of P. hall, in which 40 or 50 of the
representative business men of the town
took part. The object of the meeting
was the organization of a "Citizens' or
Independent" party. Speeches were
made by W. H. Roy, L. O. Taft, Eph-
raim Homer, R. R. Irvine, Jr., Walter Adams,
John E. Booth, Ralph Archibald, J. W.

Burgess, W. K. Henry and others. Each
and all of the speakers were very pro-
nounced in favor of organizing a third
party and put an independent ticket in
the field. For this purpose a mass con-
vention will be held on Tuesday night.
W. E. Rydahl was elected chairman and
E. A. Mitchell secretary. The plat-
form of the Independents will declare
for high license and strict regulation
on the liquor question, providing it
says anything about that issue. In
any event it will not be in favor of pro-
hibition, but will declare in favor of
beautifying and improving Provo city
and making it the ideal college and
residence town of the state.
The Republican and Democratic par-
ties have both declared for prohibition,
so there is no issue between them. The
third or independent party it is un-
derstood will be opposed to local or
city prohibition.

PATETIC DIVORCE SUIT CASE.

PROVO, Oct. 11.—A rather pathetic
case came before Judge Booth in the
divorce suit of Lavinia V. Clayton vs.
James M. Clayton, in which plaintiff
was given the custody of John Clayton
Hill, a three-and-a-half-year-old boy,
which is now living with his grandpa-
rents, Mr. and Mrs. John Hill of Provo,
Utah. The decree provides that the
mother shall have the right to visit the
boy but there had been some hitch in
carrying out this provision, and the
matter was brought before the court by
the mother. Judge Booth had a talk
with the child in private, and when he
returned to the bench stated that the
child, who is a very bright little fellow,
had through some influence 23 cents very
much estranged from the mother in its
feelings, which was a great wrong to
the child. The grandparents, Mr. and
Mrs. John Hill, denied any responsi-
bility for this condition. The judge or-
dered that the child go to its mother,
who is now living in Salt Lake, for
one week, when he would make further
orders. The little one, however, was
very much opposed to going on the
visit, and wanted to go with his grand-
parents.

REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES

For Councilmen and City Offices—
Democrats Declare for
Prohibition.
(Special Correspondence.)
LOGAN, Oct. 10.—At the Republican
primaries last evening the following
were selected as the Republican nomi-
nees for councilmen: First ward, Olf
I. Pederson; Second ward, J. A. Bel-
trami; Third ward, John Quayle; Fourth
ward, S. O. Stevens, renominated, and
Bishop Lorin Merrill. The Republican
convention will be held tomorrow night
at the county courthouse.

The Democratic city convention was
held at the county courthouse last
evening where a large delegation met
to nominate a city Democratic ticket.
The principal feature of the conven-
tion was the pledging of the candidates
to uphold the wishes of the people in
regard to the prohibition question as
expressed at the polls. S. W. Kimball
was named to head the ticket as
mayor; President Kimball is a strong
prohibitionist as are also the Demo-
cratic candidates for the city council
who were named in the city primaries.
The other candidates are: for recorder,
Miss Mae Benson, renominated; at-
torney, C. H. Hart, treasurer, Joseph P.
Morrell.

SCHOOLHOUSE FOR CLARKSTON.

LOGAN, Oct. 10.—The county board
of education met yesterday and aside
from regular routine work decided to
build a school building at Clarkston
of five rooms. Member J. E. Griffin
was authorized to get plans for the
structure and go to the material on the

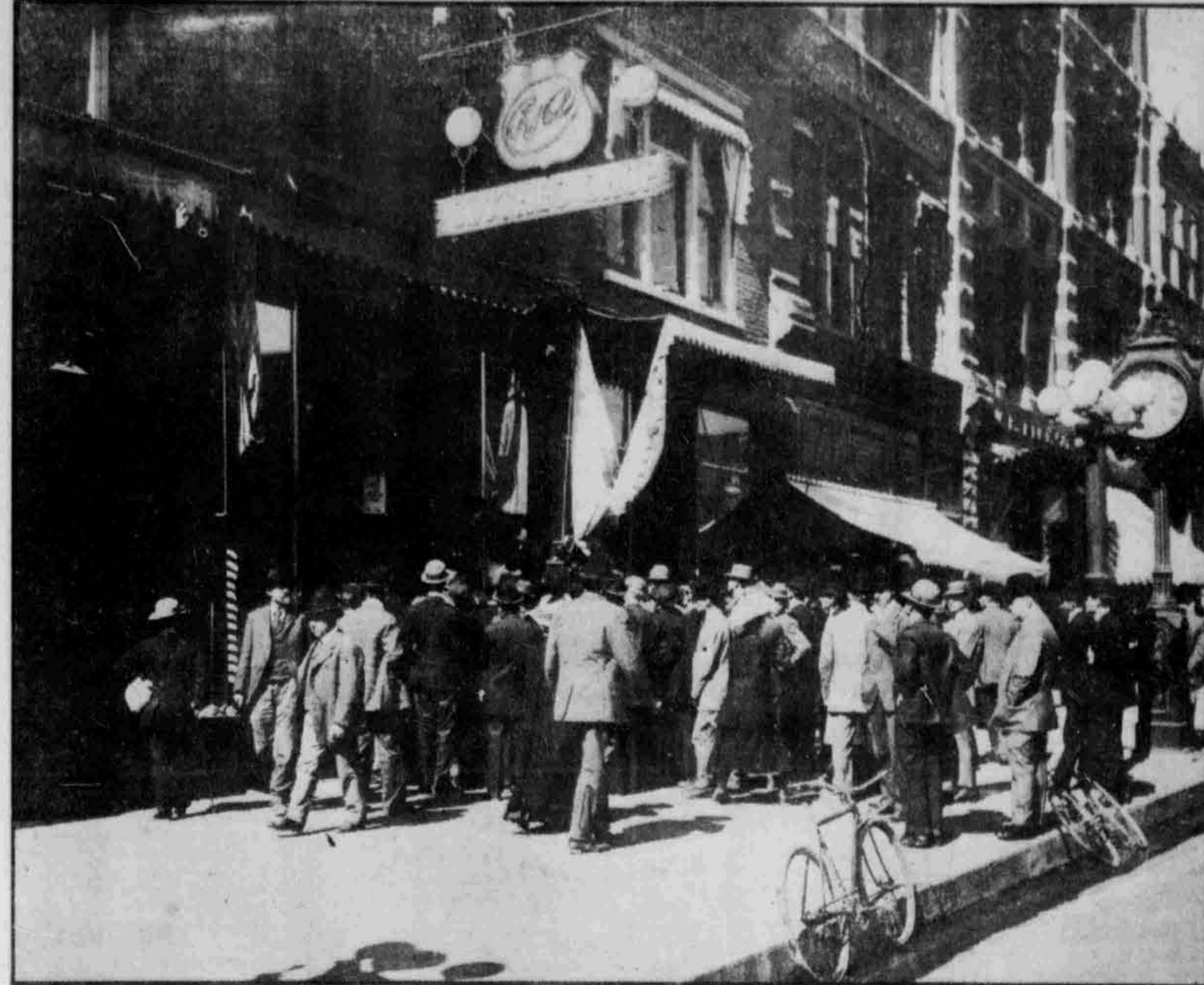

ful city.

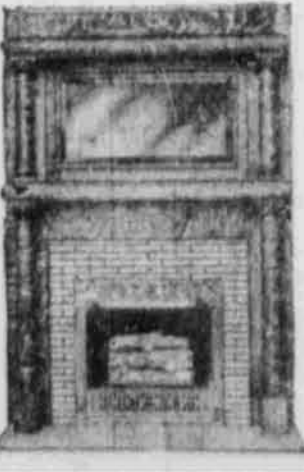
The south half is covered by other
