AT THE CONVENTION.

An Interesting Description of the Proceedings, with Fitting and Pithy Comments by Our Special Correspondent.

UTILIZING THE OCCASION.

St. Louis, June 6, 1888. St. Louis don't often get political conventions, but when she does get one she knows how to handle it in the interests of her own people. In fact, parades, processions, fireworks, veiled prophet shows, and fairs are the main industry of this city. The work of the present convention could have been transacted without any rush or hurry in two sessions, but it must be protracted so as to have one night's parade, one night's fireworks, and then general revelry the remainder of the week. There are an immensity of rural folk in town, and they must be entertained. The convention gave St. Louis a fine opportunity of advertising to the country people of Missouri, Illinois and Indiana what she could do in the way of jubilation. A Missouri farmer would mortgage his homestead to get means to come to town to see a military parade and a few sky rockets.

POMP AND DISPLAY.

Of course, we had a parade last night. The local organizations together with the city fire department turned out in full force. Several of the political clubs from abroad participated. A flambeau squad from Kansas marched. This squad seems a kind of professional circus for demonstrations. It was here a year ago. It visited Washington, and other points in the east during the past two years. The illuminations along the line of route were certainly imposing. St. Louis is ahead of Chicago in this respect. St. Louis is not much on grain elevators, railroad depots, or public buildings, but for a parade, or a circus she is magnificent. She has two solid substantial buildings right in the central part of the town—a coffin factory and a tobacco warehouse. I am told that her breweries are the wonder of the age. They are located further out, and they say it is worthy of a special trip to visit the St. Louis breweries.

In the streets and hotels politics were not much talked about this morning. Visitors from the far east and north look upon the convention as a kind of circus. Yesterday's session gives color to this allegation. Maginias and Montana are themes for laughter.

THE SECOND SESSION

opened this morning at 10:30 a. m., Mr. White of California acting as chairman. The Rev. Mr. Green offered a prayer, which certainly was not heard on earth, nor even in the convention hall. A few persons near the speakers' stand might have heard that the Deity was warmly invoked to pay special attention to what was going on in the convention.

Colorado was thanked for the silver gavel presented. Alaska was then heard from, and in future the national democratic conventions will be enlightened by the political wisdom of the cold, sunless, regions of the north-west.

Timothy Campbell of New York offered a petition reminding the convention of such a thing as the Monroe doctrine.

Mr. Mallory of Florida sent in a resolution endorsing tariff reform as recommended by President Cleveland. The report of the chairman of the committee on credentials was accepted with some slight amendments.

Mr. Cassidy of Pennsylvania, as chairman of the national committee, reported that General P. A. Collins had been unanimously agreed upon for permanent chairman. After some little skirmishing Mr. White of California gave way as temporary chairman, and General Collins of Massachusetts was installed permanent chairman.

GENERAL COLLINS

was received with marked favor both by the gentlemen of the convention and by the vast throng of visitors, male and female. He presented a most pleasing appearance. The expression of his face was that of a modest, unassuming, yet studious, intellectual person. The graceful, delicate neck and jaw bespoke the man of fine feeling and superior spirituality. As Gath would remark, Gen. Collins did not at all suggest the appearance of the Irishman, either in look or in person. But Gath does not say what this peculiar Irish "look and person" may be. Probably Gath had in mind the Harper's Weekly conception of an Irishman. However, Gen. Patrick A. Collins seems to have been moulded from earth's finest clay, and to have inherited Heaven's finest spirit.

A MODEL ADDRESS.

The permanent chairman delivered an address which should command the admiration and respect of every citi-

zen of the United States. In this address there is not one superfluous word, nor one silly insignificant phrase, nor one weak inane thought. It covers clearly and perspicuously the condition of the country. The first article of the political creed propounded for the Democratic party reads: "Equal and exact justice to all men, of whatever state or persuasion, religious or political." The 13th article is a short one, "Freedom of Religion," but it is a significant one. Does it suggest that "Freedom of Religion" is either imperilled at present, or does it mean that it is already trampled?

The whole speech was a masterpiece of political philosophy, of pure, earnest patriotism, and an echo of the finest morality and most etherealized humanity. Such a speech could never issue from the ox-necked throat of a grovelling politician, seeking popularity by demagogic methods. There is no allusion to horse-racing, or prize-ring methods in it. There are no rapid parallels from old and unread authors, no schoolboy platitudes about orange groves and golden sands, and cloud-capped pinnacles. It was a speech that left unsaid, would leave the Democratic Convention of 1888 a barren waste of senseless metaphor and insane bombast.

The next incident of importance was the surrendering of Alabama to New York in the order of calling the roll of states. This brought

on the platform. In this person is embodied the majesty of intellect, the sublimity of oratory, the divinity of humanity. He is an American Gladstone. Even in silence he strikes the spectator with awe. In his presence one becomes conscious of inferiority and spontaneously sinks within himself. And as the orator at the climax of his speech pronounced for nomination the name of Grover Cleveland, the vast audience recognize the grandeur of the occasion, and the enthusiasm which followed plainly betokens the willing obedience of matter to mind, of body to soul.

VAPORY ORAL EXUDATIONS.

Kentucky followed in a speech seconding the nomination. It was a speech better fitted for the London tattersalls, or the Lexington race course, than for an occasion like the present. It was an exhibition of bad taste, of coarse humor, of unrefined humanity, that every true American citizen must deplore. The less said about it the better.

Georgia also seconded the nomination in a speech full of nothing. It was an attempt to render the Dougherty oration through a tin whistle.

Michigan followed in a speech so chestnutty with old quotations and with fourth of July phrases, that the audience became clamorous, and reminded Michigan that the meeting was not the closing exercises of some lady college-graduates.

WHEN UTAH WAS CALLED

there was no response, though a Utah banner was visible in the rear of the delegates district. Here was an opportunity for Utah, if she were represented properly in that hall, to say something that would enlighten the convention. Here was the occasion to dwell on the speeches of these grand orators Collins and Dougherty. Here was the time to ask had we "Freedom of Religion," with the Church structures of Utah in possession of government authorities. Here was the time to ask had we free and equal rights for all? How could we reconcile the treatment of Utah with Democratic doctrine, Democratic creed, principle and profession?

But somebody says "Utah has not a religion. She does not believe in a God such as we formulate or create for the alleged public good." Yes, friend; but that same charge was made against the religion of the distinguished chairman of this convention. And for professing and adhering to a conscientious belief he witnessed in Massachusetts and in Maine, attempts to disfranchise both him and his countrymen. He saw the humble cabins of his fellow-religionists desecrated and destroyed by know-nothing mobs, inspired by creatures calling themselves gospel ministers.

What further need one go than to point to that Demosthenes of Democracy M. Dougherty himself. He is the child of parents driven from their native land by religious proscription, by carpet-bag theology, by foreign greed, rapacity and brutality.

Yes, Utah should have had a representative in that hall that would tell the world the things that ought to be told; a representative that would represent the manhood and womanhood, the intellectuality and spirituality of her people. She should have one that would not cringe and cower underneath her banner, and when her name was called, one who would come forward and demand for her the rights she is entitled to under God, under nature, under the Constitution, and above all under the creed and doctrine of democracy.

The nomination of

GROVER CLEVELAND

as candidate of the Democratic party for the Presidency of the United States was made enthusiastically unanimous. Adjournment was next in order, and after a little skirmishing it took place. What a relief to get outside that vast hall. Talk about sweating, perspiring humanity, but if such did not issue into the streets this afternoon there never was anything like overheated humanity.

I met a crowd of Chicago men, not

discussing politics nor the Shakespeare-Bacon controversy, but wondering why any person could be found willing to live in St. Louis.

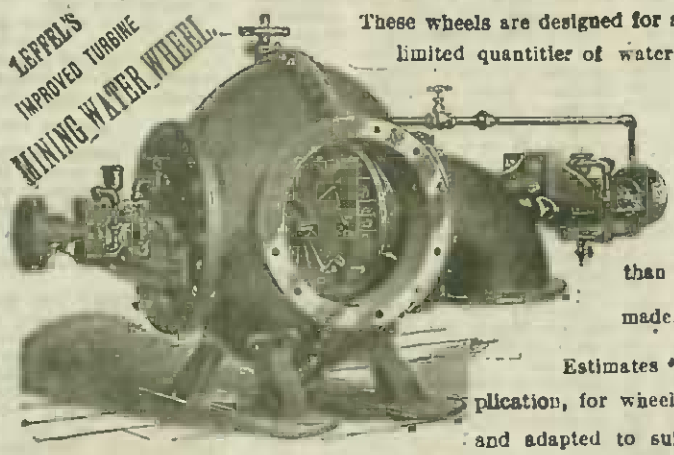
