LIVELY TIME IN PHILADELPHIA.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 28 .- The Presbyterian general assembly engaged in a lively debate today over the approval of the minutes. Rev. Dr. D. J. Moffat objected to the phraseology of the resolution creating the committee on revision. The resolution authorized the continuance of Dr. Dickey's committee and Dr. Moffat claimed that this committee had been dissolved when their report was adopted. He therefore sug. gested that the records be made to show that a new committee was appeinted even though its membershit should consist of the old committee terro. The wording of the resolution was accordingly altered and the minutes were adopted.

Then arose the question as to the chairmanship of the committee. Dr. Herrick Johnson said in view of the fact that Dr. Dickey had acted as chairman of the old committee, it would be discourteous to select a new chairman. A motion was made empowering the committee to elect their own chair-

man, but this was defeated. Dr. James E. Moffat, of Cumberland. Md., said that Dr. Dickey had been made chairman of the last committee because of his office as inoderator the assembly. He moved the election of Moderator Minton as chairman the new committee on revision and the motion was carried.

The first order of the day was the re port of the special committee on va-cancy and supply, read by Judge Rob ert N. Wilson of this city. The report contains plans for the employment of unemployed ministers and the supply of vacant churches. To carry out these plans the adoption of the following res olutions is recommended :

That all ecclesiastical changes will their occurrence by the stated clerk of the presbytery to the clerk of the general assembly who shall issue a supplement to the minutes at regula intervals containing a list b' such changes. These lists shall be furnishe without charge to the chairman o Presbyterian and synodical committe a the clerks of presbytaries and synods and, upon request, to unempl and to the clorks of sessions of acant congregations.

That a standing committee of the assembly, consisting of five ministers and four elders, is hereby constituted to be known as the standing committee on vacancy and supply. To this com-mittee shall be referred for consideraall matters connected with the subjects of employed ministers and the supply of vacant churches,

The committee with the exception of Rev. Dr. Robert F. Sample, chairman, deemed inexcedient the establishment of a permanent of a permanent committee of the assembly to act as a bureau of information in the matter of vacancies and supply. Dr. Sample offered resolutions appointing this permanent committee with a salaried corresponding secretary. The portion of the report in which all agreed was adopted and the remainder referred back to the committee to be reported upon at the next assembly.
