## SITUATION AT PORT ARTHUR CRITICAL.

The Outer Forts Have Fallen Into The Possession of the

Japanese.

THERE IS FIGHTING NICHTLY.

Jap Trenches Are Closest to Forts on Riblung and Kekwan Mountains.

Washington, Nov. 17,-Consul General Fowler today cabled the state department from Chefoo that the situation at Port Arthur is extremely critical, the outer forts having fallen into the possersion of the Japanese. He also states that three Japanese torpedoboat destroyers are lying outside of Chefoo harbor, and that the Russian crew of the torpedoboat destroyer destroyed yesterday are transferring their arms and supplies to a Chinese cruiser which in posted in front of the Russian consulate.

FIGHTING AT PORT ARTHUR.

#### Occurs on Mexican Border and May Cause Diplomatic Trouble.

San Diego, Cal., Nov. 17.—Lieut.-Gov. Barreto of Lower California has re-ported to the Mexican consul here the alleged facts of an occurrence, which may occupy the attention of the two governments. A few days ago Chief of Police Hammel of Los Angeles and a detective brought in Juan Puebla, who has been hunted for six years for the alleged murder of a man named Garcia in Santa Monica canyon. The officers in Santa Monica canyon. The officers stated that the man had been decoyed to this side of the line and arrosted at the point of guns. The lieutenant gov-ernor has complained that Puebla was captured by hired Mexicans, disarmed, heavily manacled and delivered to the officers on the Mexican side of the boundary. No action on the part of the Mexican

government has been taken by Lieut. Gov. Barreto and by Acting Gov. Remero. The lieutenant-governor states that he does not wish to be classed as protecting oriminals who have fied be-low the line but that he does want in known that Mexican law has a right to be respected, and that treaties with Mexico must be observed. The Mexi-can officials have arrested the leader of the Mexicans who delivered Puebla to Chief Hammel.
