It was while his father was gone to cessee to dispose of the property he had left there, that the Saints were en from Nauvon, "Wood" was then about fifteen years old; he gathered together what he could and with a wagon and yoke of oxen, teaving all e, he took his mother and six sisrs, and followed after the Saints as as a place called Bonaparte, on the Des Moines river; their father joined em there and moved on to the body the Church at Council Bluffs. Wood made sure of the big more. brave that had been tormenting him at close range, and as he made off, blew a large hole clean through him; he never stirred after he fell. One soldier was killed out of the troop of

20, and two were wounded. The fleeing Indians that night went to the Shell Creek station, killed the three station keepers, burnt the building, and drove off the horses. 'Wood" was with the company that

went to Cedar valley to arrest the In-dian Chief Tintic, and upon serving the papers in the lodge, a fight com-menced in which several Indians were illed and George Carson, one of the "Mormon" party, lost his life. He took an active part in guarding

the city of Provo in early days, and was foremost in repelling the insults of the soldiery from Johnson's army, who were stationed in Provo around the old eminary building, where Judge Cradle baugh was holding court. The same spirit that actuated "Wood" in Missouri in defending the "Mormon" people made itself very apparent at this time. #### NOT UINTAH RESERVATION Uprising Was Said to be Among the

Uncompangre Utes.

From the following, which appeared in the Denver Post, it seems that the threatened Indian uprising was on the Uncompangre reservation, not the Uintah:

"No information of impending trouble among the Uintah Indians has been recelved here," said Gen. H. C. Merriam at army headquarters this morning. "The friction between the Indians and the sheep men that we hear of is in the Uncompanigre reservation. The trouble with the Uintahs was two years ago, Since that time there have been no com.

plaints. When his attention was called to a dispatch stating that Superintendent Geo. F. Bucher of the Uintah forest reserve had said that the Indians had ab-solute control of the leasing of lands to

sheep men for grazing purposes, Gen. Merriam said: "That is not true. It is the agent who does the leasing. They have no voice in the matter and it is because these leasers allow their flocks of sheep to go beyond the boundaries of the sections leased and defile the springs upon which the Indians depend for water that the red men are pro-testing and growing hostile."

## THE JOINT CONVENTION.

#### Dr. Beach of Denver Tells How to Solve the Utah Problem.

The meeting of the thirteenth annual convention of the Christian Endeavorers and the Epworth leaguers of Utah. opened at the First Congregational church last evening.
