SUNDRY CIVIL BILL.

Washington, March 25.-The principal items of reduction in the sundry civil bill, compared with the present law, consist of \$7,995,550 for public buildings, \$12,335,950 for river and harbor improvements, \$3,000,000 for military posts at Manila, \$750,000 for the office building for the house of representatives and \$200,000 for the Denver mint.

The appropriation for furnishing and care of the White House was reduced from \$60,000 to \$35,000.
