

THREE PRISONERS ARRAIGNED TODAY.

Willis Pleads Not Guilty to Grand Larceny and Receiving Stolen Property.

JOHN HARMON DOES LIKEWISE.

Three prisoners were arraigned before Judge Morse in the criminal division of the district court today and entered pleas of not guilty to the charges against them.
