

THREE PRISONERS ARRAIGNED TODAY.

Willis Pleads Not Guilty to Grand Larceny and Receiving Stolen Property.

JOHN HARMON DOES LIKEWISE.

Cases Against Gordon, Burns and James A. Luke Are Continued, the Latter for Term.

Three prisoners were arraigned before Judge Morse in the criminal division of the district court today and entered pleas of not guilty to the charges against them. L. J. Willis entered a plea of not guilty to the charges of grand larceny and receiving stolen property. Fred Pepin entered a plea of not guilty to grand larceny.

John Harrison was arraigned on two counts, charging burglary and one charging housebreaking, and entered pleas of not guilty to all three of them. It is charged that on Nov. 19, Harrison attempted to burglarize the dental office of Dr. Cook on the Eagle block.

CASES CONTINUED.

The trial of the case of the state vs. James Gordon and John C. Burns was continued until tomorrow morning. The defendants demanded a separate trial, so Gordon will be tried first.

THE KEEN-NIPPER CASE.

W. H. Sherman Says the Letters in Dispute Were Not Forged.

W. H. Sherman, paying teller of the Commercial National bank, was the star witness for the prosecution in the Keen-Nipper case today. Despite the testimony of F. E. McGurkin and W. F. Adams for the defense, to the effect that Mr. Nipper's letters had been materially changed from their original condition, Mr. Sherman testified, and with a good degree of positiveness, that the letters had not been changed and that the seeming irregularities and omissions were clearly the work of the author and not forgeries as had been intimated.

Mr. Sherman first took the stand shortly before court adjourned yesterday afternoon and after Assistant Cashier Howard of Walker Bros' bank had given similar testimony, he was recalled when court opened this morning and was put through a rigid cross-examination by Judge Powers, who endeavored to confuse the witness and cause him to change his original statements, but without avail. Mr. Sherman based his testimony on examinations and experiments and stuck to it through thick and thin, so to speak. He was on the stand when this report closed.

The case will probably occupy another day, as after the testimony is completed it will be necessary to hear the arguments, after which it will go to the jury.

Arguments in Election Contest.

Judge Lewis this morning heard arguments on the demurrer to the complaint and motion to strike out in the election contest case of George D. Dean vs. George E. Burbridge, councilman-elect from the Second precinct. After the arguments were heard, the court, under advisement by the court and further hearing of the case was continued until Monday, Dec. 14.

Suit for divorce was filed in the district court today by Reulah S. Hayward against Frank Hayward on the ground of failure to support. They were married in Provo on Dec. 8, 1899, and it is alleged that defendant has failed to support his wife and child ever since Sept. 26, 1901.

WARR BREAKS OUT AGAIN.

Creates a Disturbance on Emerging From the County Jail.

Carl Warr, of Sugar House ward, who, on two previous occasions, was charged with insanity and who was released yesterday from the county jail after serving 90 days for assault, again got on the warpath last night at his home and created such a disturbance that the sheriff had to be notified and had to send two deputies to arrest the young man.

Warr has made numerous threats against the lives of members of his family and has been so frightened that they are in terror all the time he is at home. He was discharged upon his hearings for insanity but was found guilty of assault upon his father and mother and was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail. He was released yesterday and proceeded to go home and create another disturbance. Deputy Sheriff Steve Smith and Warr were sent to Sugar last night about midnight and brought Warr to jail.

CRUSHED BY FALLING MASONRY.

Geo. Goodling, a Carpenter, Killed By Foundations of Home Caving in on Him.

PROBABLY DEAD FOR TWO DAYS

Horrible Discovery Was Made in Southeastern Part of the City This Morning.

George Goodling, a carpenter about 50 years of age, residing at Ninth South and Rice street, met with a horrible death early Monday evening or Tuesday morning, and his crushed and blackened body was not discovered until today. His life was crushed out by probably more than a ton of brick and stone falling on him while he was at work under the porch of his new house that he was building. Judging from the injuries his body shows, death came upon him instantly, but how long his body remained under the brick and stone no one knows. It was discovered about 9:30 o'clock this morning by H. A. Roemisch, a contractor for whom Goodling had been working for two years or more, and John F. Heath, a neighbor of Goodling's.

WAS UNMARRIED.

Goodling, who was an unmarried man, lived in one room on Rice street and put in his spare time working on an addition to his house. The foundation was all in and he was building an arch under the porch. He had crawled under the porch to remove the timbers that supported the brick and stone when the heavy material caved in on him and crushed his life out. Goodling was in a death trap. The downfall of brick was so sudden that he did not even have a chance to cry out, or escape from his dangerous position, and his body remained there until this morning. It probably would not have been found this morning but for the fact that Mr. Roemisch went to Goodling's house to give him a job. The house was unlocked but there was no fire in the stove or any signs about the place to indicate that Goodling had been there recently.

HOW DISCOVERY WAS MADE.

Going out to the new part of the building, the contractor noticed an spirit level and a hammer lying on the ground. He at once suspected that something was wrong and began to look for the missing man. He was then joined by Mr. Heath who assisted him in the search. Noticing the timbers lying at the opening to the arch, Mr. Roemisch said:

"Heath, George is in there and has been killed."

The two men then crawled into the arch, opening a narrow passage, and found Goodling protruding from a mass of brick and stone.

NEIGHBORS REMOVE BODY.

Several of the neighbors were called to assist, and the work of removing the body began. The police were notified and the patrol wagon and several officers hurried to the scene. It was soon evident to them upon a brief examination, that Goodling's death was the result of an accident. Coroner Clark was notified and hastened to the scene to investigate. A jury was selected and an inquest will probably be held tomorrow morning.

LAST SEEN ON MONDAY.

The last time Goodling was seen at work was on Monday evening, when Mr. John F. Heath saw and spoke to him. "He was working around his place on Monday evening when I saw him," said Mr. Heath. "When not employed on a job he worked on his new house. I can not imagine what his object was in making that arch under the foundation unless it was for a sort of a coal hole. The poor fellow had crawled under there to remove the timber when the whole works caved in on him and killed him. He has lived here for a long time and for Mr. Roemisch he has worked about two years. He was sober, honest, and a good workman. He was not married and has no relatives here. I think he has several brothers in Indiana. He owned a farm there and one of the brothers rented it from him. He received letters from his brothers frequently but a few days ago I heard him complaining that one of his brothers

had not been very prompt in sending the rent for the farm."

Whether the body will be buried here or shipped to his relatives will not be decided upon until the latter are heard from.
