LOCAL BRIEFS.

Great Salt Lake has risen one inch in the last two weeks.

A feature on the streets today was a motor triplex, which attracted considerable attention.

The funeral of the late Col. William Heintz was held at 2 p. m. yesterday from 508 State street, with interment in the City cemetery.

At the fire drill at the Fremont school yesterday the entire school was vacated by the pupils in the very good time of 3 1/2 minutes by the watch.

The alterations and improvements being made in the offices of the Utah Light & Railway company will require three weeks for their completion.

The local opera of Florida was creditably given Thursday night, in the Nineteenth ward hall, and in fact was so well received that it will be repeated this evening, in aid of the ward meetinghouse fund.

A Pennsylvania Congressman has written to one of the prime movers in this city for the recovery of mileage from the Philippines, that now is the time to take aggressive action and push the bill for relief through Congress.

The great New Year's lunch display at the "Commercial club" is now retained in visible remembrance by suitable photographs taken by flashlight. Manager Harris is showing the same to visitors who are duly and deeply impressed, and one of our exclaim, "Oh, that I had been there!"

A good deal of flour and grain from Oregon is still being shipped to this city, and a local dealer says these importations are now permanent on account of the reversion to sugar beet raising of so much acreage formerly given to wheat and other grains. For this reason Utah no longer produces all the grain needed to make flour for its inhabitants.

At Harmonie hall tomorrow, Sunday evening, at 8 o'clock, Mr. Charles E. Randall speaks on "Can Poverty Be Abolished?" from the Socialist point of view. These meetings are popular with those interested in the discussion of social and economic problems. Music is to be a regular feature, and a varied list of speakers is promised at succeeding sessions.

Captains O. R. Grow of the brigade staff, and W. C. Webb of the Light Battery, gave a banquet Thursday evening to the officers of the national guard in this city, at the home of Mrs. Grow, 209 North Third West. There were 15 officers present, and the evening was very pleasantly spent. The recent experiences in the Carbon county camps were largely the topic of toast and remark generally.
