All the conditions were usually favor-able when he first saw the ring, and again on September 7, under favorable circumstances, he saw it as a faintly shining but clearly defined zone. But when he went to look for it again on September 11 relther he nor another skilled observer, Jarry-Desloges, could find the faintest trace of it. They believe it possible that the ring is only visible at certain times, de-pending on the angle at which it is presented to the earth and also to the illumination of the sun's rays. They think some of the observatories in every high places where the air is very clear, such as Flagetaff, Ariz, or Arequips, Feru, may he able to verith it.
