Been Broken for New Plant. Ground has been broken for the new 2.000-ton mill on the Ohio Copper Co. at the mouth of Mascotte tunnel, on the Lark side, and within 90 days 300

additional men will find employment on the new operations of the Bingham Con., under the Heinze management,

Con., under the Heinze management, says the Bingham Bulletin. The Mascotte tunnel is being driven through the mountain following a northerly course and within 1½ miles will tape both the Ohio and Commer-cial properties. This plan is to trans-port all the ores of these mines through the tunnel direct to the new mull site which is just below the old Lark dump. The tunnel will be 71/2 ft, at top and 8 feet in width at the base and as projected by Colin P. McIntosh, the engineer in charge, will be driven about 7,500 feet from its present ter-

A new compressor is being planned A new compressor is being planned to replace the present one at the mouth of the tunnel, which will be of sufficient capacity to furnish air to the Commercial and Ohio as well as for the operations in the tunnel and drifts on the Lark side. In order to accommodate conditions for the new mill site, the railway is running a new track to the site of the mill and trestiling the guich. The machinery and equipment for

the mill and trestling the guidt. The machinery and equipment for the concentrator has been ordered and is said to be on the cars now with probability of the first delivery being made within 30 days. To accommodate the largely in-creasing number of men employed at Lark, the company has planner the erection of another bunk house with room for 200 more workers. The present pay rolls of the Bingham Con. on the Lark side carries 320 names. With the additions to be made within the next few months this number will be doubled. be doubled.
