BULGARIA WAITS ON THE EMPERORS.

Will Take No Decisive Step Until The Result of Their Meeting is Known.

CONSTANTINOPLE IS ANXIOUS.

A Veritable Reign of Terror Exists At Monastir, the Tales of Atrocities Being Simply Terrible.

London, Sept. 19 .- The situation in the Balkans occupies to some extent the imperial meeting at Vienna. The German chancellor. Von Buelow, paid a visit lasting 90 minutes to the Austro-Hungarian premier. Count Goluchowsky, yesterday. At the Bulgarian agency in Vienna it was declared that under any circumstances. Bulgaria would await the result of the meeting of Emperor Francis Joseph and the chancellors before taking any decisive step. There is no diminution of the war apprehension in Constantinople where it is believed that war would already have broken out but that the concentration of Turkish troops at Adrianople upset the Bulgarian wans of a dash on Constantinople with a large army in the hope of avoiding a campaign. Inquiries made by the Associated Press regarding the massacre at Kastoria tend to show that the number of killed has been exaggerated.

Dispatches from Athens report that Greece is covering her frontier with troops to prevent the incursion of Bulgarian refugees. A dispatch from Salakov to the Times slated Sept. 18, says the number of Macedonian emigrants and refugees along the frontier is daily increasing and it is calculated that there are now 20,000 in the various towns, villages and border districts from Burgas to Kostendin, all eagerly looking forward to the day of reckoning of the Turks. Many are compelled to remain inactive through the insufficient supply of arms and ammunition. The committees find difficult in keeping pace with the demand for rifles, as the weapons are arriving slowly and irregularly, owing to the various obstacles encountered in transit. cles encountered in transit.

From London it is reported that the British government will send a fleet to Turkish waters while reports from Constantinople state that Great Britain, France and Italy have intervened to prevent the continuance of massacres in Macedonia. It is said that yesterday the representatives of these powers noin Macedonia. It is said that yesterday the representatives of these powers notified the sultan of their dissatisfaction with the methods of suppressing the outbreak and declared that the massacres must be stopped. It is stated that they made special reference to the excesses committed by the Turkish troops in the vilayet of Uskub, where the revolutionary outbreak is insignificant and affords no excuse to the soldiers for pillaging and burning the soldiers for pillaging and burning the villages and killing the inhabitants. The porte is said to have replied that Turkey is simply carrying out the wishes expressed by the powers, which

wishes expressed by the powers, which urge the sultan's government to adopt energetic measures to suppress the revolution as speedily as possible. The report that the powers have taken such action has been received with great satisfaction by the Bulgarian ministry. The diplomatic corps here also appears to be much relieved that Turkey has taken the news of Bulgaria's mobilization steps much more quietly than

A special dispatch from Bila says that several Bulgarlan bands under Capt. Stoyanoff attacked Melinik, province of Seres, 65 miles northeast of Salonica. Two regiments of infantry and cavalry and artillery in support were sent from Djoumala to relieve the garrison and they forced the insurgents to retire to the mountains, where they are being pursued by the troops.

Desperate fighting is reported to be proceeding in a defile of the valley of the Strumitza between Turkish troops and Bulgarians under Gen. Sontchief. Reinforcements of troops have been sent from Screen. sent from Seres.

BULGARIANS KILLED.

Salonica, Sept. 18.—Three hundred Bulgarlans have been killed in a fight between insurgents and Turkish troops between Okhrida and Dibra. The Bulgarlan dead include many officers, one of whom wore a Russian decoration.

A battallon of Rediffs attacked the Christian gendarmes at Mitrovitza Sept. 16 and several of the latter were killed and wounded. The rest of the gendarmes took refuge at the Russian consulate where they were beselged. The eitnation at Mitrovitza is extremely critical.

BEAVERS' EXAMINATION.
