LOCAL BRIEFS.

Vandalism—A resident in the southeast section of the city complains that the decorations on his front porch were torn down last night by vandals.

Small Blaze—A fire in the hallway at 140 West South Temple street last night caused a damage of \$50 to the building before it was extinguished by the department.

Tunnels Open—Track laying through the Spring Garden and Beckwith tunnels on the western Pacific has been completed, the distances being 7,300 and 6,000 feet respectively.

Cardinal Gibbons—Cardinal Gibbons has changed his itinerary somewhat, so that his visit to Salt Lake will be August 11-15 instead of August 14-17. A reception for either Friday or Saturday night is now being arranged.

SUDDEN DEATH OF ABRAHAM H. CANNON

Stricken With a Hemorrhage, He Passes Away at the Age of 23.

Abraham H. Cannon, better known to his friends as "June," died suddenly at the home of his father-in-law, James Hansen, this city, shortly after 5 o'clock last evening, in the twenty-fourth year of his age. Ever since his return from a mission to Holland in September, 1907, his health has not been the most rugged—indeed, it was his impaired strength which caused his release from his missionary labors before the usual time had passed. It was hoped, however, that a return to his mountain home would effect a restoration, and this hope seemed for a time to be realized. But within the last month he had declined perceptibly, and had suffered several severe hemorrhages, during the latest of which he passed away yesterday. During all this sickness he has maintained a courageous and confident attitude, and only yesterday morning while at his mother's home in Cannon ward, whither he had driven in his buggy, he declared that he felt better and stronger than for many days past. He was the son of the late Abraham H. and Sarah A. Jenkins Cannon, and was born on the anniversary of his father's birth, March 12, 1886. He left for a mission to the Netherlands March 20, 1905, and returned, as above stated, Sept. 11, 1907. One year later he married Miss Bertha Hansen, at the residence of whose parents he died. After his return from his mission he was chosen a member of the Pioneer stake Sunday school board, acting in that capacity until May, 1909, when he was chosen second counselor in the bishopric of Cannon ward. He leaves, to mourn his untimely death, a devoted young wife, a fond mother and loving brothers and sisters, besides a wide circle of relatives and friends. His young or brother, Lester, only recently left this city for a mission in the Netherlands.

The funeral services will be held in Pioneer stake hall on Wednesday next, at 10 p. m., by the Rev. J. P. Demsey, A. B. He was viewed by friends at the Hansen residence, 25 Pitt street, from 12 to 2 o'clock that day.
