STEEL SCHEDULES.

STEEL SCHEDULES. Paragraph 328 was changed so as to tax fire fabrics, or fabrics used for puternatic tires, at 45 per cent ad va-lorem. This meant to tax long staple cotton used in the fabric. The steel and iron schedules, steel ingots blooms and slabs were reduced from 1 cent to eight-tenths of a cent and from four-tenths to three-tenths of a cent a pound. The ad valorem duty on boiler and plate iron or steel was stricken out. Some of them were made specific and others were slightly re-duced.
