PARTY MEMBERS COMPETENT OR NOT

Asst. City Attorney Dininney Would Limit Field for City Employment.

"AMERICANS" DISSATISFIED.

All Maintain That the Detention Home Is Essentially Necessary for Proper Conduct of the Work.

some arrangement will no doubt be made for volunteers probation officers.

STATEMENT ISSUED.

In regard to the detention home and probation work, the Women's American club has issued this statement:

"As early as June, 1906, the Women's American club placed itself on record as favoring the establishment of a home of detention for girls, in connection with the juvenile court. At that time there were two institutions where boys were detained pending an investigation of their cases, but nothing for girls. To show that we were in earnest in the matter, one of our members, Mrs. Lee Chamberlain, took care of several girls in her home to save them from the city jail. We also undertook to establish a home for girls, pledging ourselves to assume the financial responsibility of maintaining the home. We had all our plans in readiness when an arbitrary decision of the then judge of the juvenile court caused us to abandon the work. Last winter a committee was formed to go to the city council with the legislative committee having the bill in charge, to urge them to make provision in the bill for the establishment of a detention home. We were informed that it would not be necessary for the committee to act at the new session, as the power was given to that effect. Evidently the legislature did not do its work well, for we have the spectacle of the city and county officials, quibbling as to which shall take the initiative in the matter. Whether we shall have a home at all, we cannot tell, but we will go forward through the police power, if necessary, to another alternative. Since the abandonment of the Morris home, the cycling evil, which has existed in our midst for so long, has become very much worse for boys as well as girls have no home of detention like jail. Now as members of the Women's American club, we are determined to do all upon every woman of Salt Lake City, who has the uplifting of the youth of the city at heart, to unite with us in demanding of the city and county officials, that they cease quibbling, and at once establish, at least a temporary home of detention, and then remove the stigma attached to the name of our city, that our wayward boys and girls are not cared for in a proper manner."
