## CRUSHED TO HIS DEATH.

### Heavy Gate Falls on Lacy Greer, a Prom inent Citizen and "Mormon,"

St. Jomes, Ariz., Nov. 25.-Lacy Greer, one of the best known young men of Apache county, was accidental-ly killed at Holbrook station, yesterday morning about 7 o'clock, by the falling of a gate at the railroad stockyards. Mr. Greer was a resident of Concho and he had gone to Holbrook to ship some horses that he had sold, and went down to the corrals early to turn the horses out, but desiring to keep some saddle animals in, he and the buyer were hurriedly closing the gates when the one he was pushing on came oose from its hinges and fell upon him, crushing him to the ground. As the gate weighed about 800 pounds, and fell with such force, it seems certain that he was killed instantly. His body was brought here and will be burled from the conference hall tomorrow

morning. Lacy Greer was a native of Bosque county, Texas, but he came to this part of Arizona when but a child of four years, and long before there was an Apache county. His father, Thom-as Greer, was the first treasurer of Apache county, and the family has al-ways been the most wealthy and one of the most prominent "Mormon" illes of this part of Arizona. He mar-ried early in life, and though he was but \$2 years of age he was the father of seven children.
