

## What Must Follow.

The Raleigh (N. C.) Standard says that war must follow dissolution; that "it will be impossible for the northwestern and gulf states to avoid war, the navigation of the Mississippi will lead to it."

"If war once breaks out, it will rage in the interior, on our sea coasts, on the high seas, and on our frontiers. Twenty millions of northern people will at once become our enemies. State bonds will be repudiated. Banks will break. Widows and orphans will be reduced to beggary. The sword will wave everywhere paramount to all law. The whole world outside the slaveholding States, with slight exceptions, is opposed to slavery; and the whole world, with slave labor thus rendered insecure and comparatively valueless, will take sides with the North against us. The end will be—Abolition!"
