

**DEPARTED THIS LIFE.**—On Saturday afternoon ex-governor J. Neely Johnson died at the Salt Lake House in this city, of softening of the brain.

Deceased was born at Evansville, Indiana, August 25, 1825, where he studied law, which he commenced to practice in Iowa. In 1849 he went to California and settled in Sacramento, where he lived while a resident of that State. In 1850 he was elected city attorney for Sacramento. In 1856 he was elected governor of California by the "Know Nothing" party. In 1860 he moved to Carson, then in Utah, but now the capital of Nevada, where he also engaged actively in matters looking to the future prosperity of his new home. He was a member of the first constitutional convention; and in 1865 or '66 he was appointed to fill a vacancy on the supreme bench, and was subsequently elected to the same position. In the fall of 1871 he came to Salt Lake City, desiring to make it his permanent residence, and where he remained until his death.

Mr. Johnson's remains were conveyed to the Episcopal church yesterday afternoon, where the funeral services were conducted. They were taken thence to the Camp Douglass burying ground, escorted by the masonic fraternity of this city, of which he was a member.

Mrs. Johnson and son were with Mr. Johnson at his death, having come to this city a short time since for the purpose of waiting upon him in his illness.

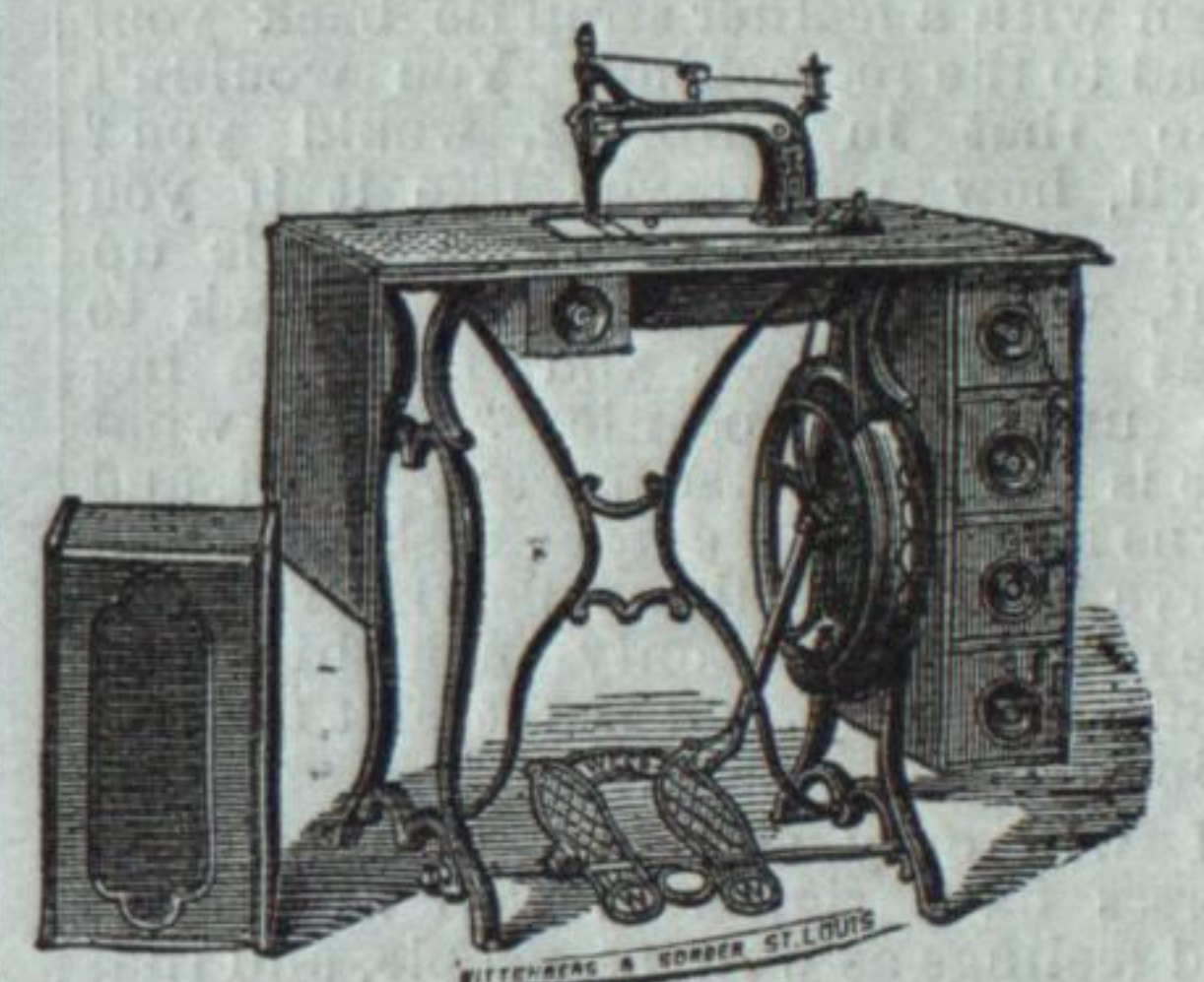
