

TELEGRAPHIC. FIGHT AT LARISSA.

The Greeks Claim to Have Been Successful So Far.

TURKS CROSS THE FRONTIER.

Disaster Fighting at Kiriti—The Hellas in a Dangerous Position.

New York, April 22.—A special to the Free Press from Larissa, dated April 22, midnight, says: The Greeks had the best of the fighting today. The battle has been long and hard, and the movements of either side have been marked. This evening the main armies occupied nearly the same position as they did this morning. The fighting all day was severe.

Tomorrow the Greeks will try to storm the principal Turkish fort on the Helles pass. Should they be successful, they will be in a position to pass an army into Turkish territory, while maintaining their own frontier.

The work of the Greek artillery has been superb.

TURKISH DRIVERS BACK.

Larissa, Headquarters of the Greek Army, April 22.—The latest advice as to the situation at Larissa shows that on Monday the Turks made a sortie from the town and attacked the Greek position at Kiriti. The fighting was very severe. After several fighting the Greeks drove the Turks back across the frontier with a loss of five guns.

Four hundred members of the foreign legion, including twenty-five Englishmen under Capt. Hume, arrived here on Monday. They were treated with a great demonstration, which was repeated on their departure for the front to the evening. Among the men was a great number of the Greek army. The Greeks were anxious to extend into the plain, but being rebuffed by the Greek battery and by the Egean army, they were forced to retreat back on Larissa with great loss. A portion of the fleeing Turks have reformed the Moudon peninsula.

The Greek army, extending in a semi-circle from Tyrnavos to Karavali, and supported by artillery, drove back the Turks again. It is understood that the latter are retreating to force toward Larissa.

Chief Dravelli and the survivors of his band of irregulars have returned here from their raid into Macedonia.

FIGHTING AT KIRITI.

Melrose Park, April 21.—(Delayed in transmission.) The fight at Kiriti continues in a desultory way. The position is not so favorable as it was yesterday. Notwithstanding the order to take Kiriti by force, the Turkish troops are lagging in their intention to do so.

Yesterday two Albanian regiments, having driven the Greeks from their position, pursued them to a little spur of a mountain overlooking the plain. The pursuit was against the order of the Greeks. It was impossible to restrain them. They still hold the spur, declaring that it is impossible for a Turkish soldier to retreat.

GREEK WAR COUNCIL.

Athens, April 22.—(A. M.)—The ministers held a prolonged conference at the war office yesterday, and then went to the royal palace for a council, at which King George presided. It is said that very important decisions were taken.

The eastern squadron has bombarded Kiriti and destroyed the customs-house and other public buildings. The western squadron has bombarded Moudon, north of Plevna, and captured a Turkish steamer.
