Last Night's Dispatches.  
EASTERN.  
Resignation of Charles Francis Adams, Jr.  
NEW YORK, 4.—The Tribune's  
Washington agent, Charles Francis  
Adams, Jr., of his post as govern-  
ment director of the Union Pacific  
Railroad, submitted to the Presi-  
dent and cabinet, yesterday.  
The reasons assigned by Adams for  
this step are very fully set forth in  
his communication, which was not  
read, but the contents of which are  
stated in brief by the Secretary of  
the Interior.  
Adams thinks it hardly right or  
proper that the government director  
of the company, who is expected  
to act as a sort of censor upon it,  
should be dependent upon the com-  
pany for his salary and for his  
expenses. It is a matter which is  
regulated by law, and the govern-  
ment directors, of course, have no  
control over it. It is easy to see  
that the position of the director  
under such circumstances, cannot  
be pleasant. Adams also thinks  
that the directors of the Pacific Rail-  
road do not have as much power as  
they ought to exercise, and that  
the affairs of the Company  
and its management, the executive  
committee of the company, without  
the intervention, in many cases, of  
the directors. This is also the cri-  
tique of the company. Finally, Adams  
thinks that the compensation of a  
government director is not sufficient  
to enable him to give the amount of  
time and labor to his duties, which  
their importance demand. The salary  
is \$10 a day, which is only about  
\$600 a year. No action was taken  
on the resignation.

**THE SILENT SUPPLY.**  
The Times says: Although the  
available supply of bar silver will  
probably in a day or two be sup-  
plemented by the amount brought  
by the Pacific steamers, none  
could be had on Friday, and even  
had there been a demand sufficient  
to make necessary the  
payment of the silver, it is  
doubtful whether any amount  
would have been forthcoming. The  
demand from any quarter at pre-  
sent is exceedingly limited, and an  
inquiry on Austrian account seems  
now to have practically ceased, the  
presence of anything more than the  
mere nominal amounts on the mar-  
ket would only be prejudicial to  
present prices.

**STEAMER City of Peking to-day:** Sil-  
ver bars, 13,881; trade dollars, 11,  
508; Mexican, 88,047; gold coin,

were 100,000 trade dollars, being  
part of 400,000 reported as having

**FOREIGN.**  
GREAT BRITAIN.  
The Amerer's Flight.  
LONDON, 4.—The Viceroy of India  
telegraphs the details of the  
Amerer's withdrawal from Cabul.  
The Amerer held Durbar on Decem-  
ber 10th, when it was resolved that,  
after the fall of Ali Masjid and  
Feyzabad, no further resistance could  
be placed on his troops or the resis-  
tance offered. The Amerer there-  
fore concluded to seek Russian pro-  
tection and place his troops before  
Kabul. The Amerer's flight was  
Yakob Khan, his son, in charge.  
Yakob was released the same day,  
and the oath was administered that  
he should do as the Amerer direct-  
ed. The Amerer's flight was

eral Roberts, offering his  
services, and says the Amerer  
has gone to St. Petersburg.
