

LOS ANGELES' MAYOR RESIGNS

Seems to Have Been in Fulfillment Of Promise to Withdraw on Certain Conditions.

MYSTERY SURROUNDS CASE

Paper to Which Letter Was Sent Says Reasons for It Are Unpublishable.

Los Angeles, Cal., Mar. 11.—Mayor A. C. Harper tendered his resignation as mayor tonight. He declined to make any statement in regard to his action. The mayor announced that he would have an statement for the press or public tonight.

The mayor has been a candidate for re-election at a special election called for March 26, under the recall act of the city charter. He had been recalled from office by a petition signed by 1,000 voters because of various allegations of misconduct made against him.

Following his resignation Mayor Harper announced that he would withdraw as a candidate for re-election. This caused even more surprise than the resignation, which as it did in the heat of a campaign which has been hotly waged for weeks by the Municipal League and Civic Union, and as it was made by the friends of the mayor. It follows causing the resignation of Edward Kern as a member of the board of public works, whose appointment by Mayor Harper to that position was given by the political opponents of the mayor as one of the principal causes for the recall election.

For several months two of the leading newspapers of this city have been publishing articles alleging that Mayor Harper has permitted the recall of Kern to be prevented in this city, and that his own official and private acts have not been above reproach.

An unsuccessful attempt was made by Thomas Lee Woodcock, a former assistant city attorney, to bring before the grand jury of the county specific charges of grafting and misconduct against the mayor.

Following the resignation, which was presented to the city clerk, there appeared in an extra edition of an afternoon paper a letter to the manager, in which the mayor said:

"In fulfillment of my obligation entered into with you when I promised to withdraw my name from the ballot in the present recall election whenever you demanded that I should do so, I hereby notify you that in compliance with your demand, made this day, I have requested the county clerk to withdraw my name from the ballot."

In explanation of its action in making the demand for his withdrawal upon the mayor, the paper asserts that "the reasons that it has taken this drastic action are unpublishable," and it did so in order to safeguard the people of Los Angeles in the approaching election, after searching Mayor Harper's official and private record.

Further, the paper says, disclosures have been made which are in no way connected with the alleged disclosures of the grand jury.

The grand jury in its final report, had scored Mayor Harper for alleged acts of indecorum and cited several instances of alleged offensive acts, both as a private citizen and in his capacity of mayor, but no indictment was found against him and no action taken by the district attorney concerning the work of the grand jury.

It is the mayor's contention tonight that his resignation at this time makes the calling of the recall election null and void, and that the power to name his successor to fill out his unexpired term lies with the council, which will

AN ACT OF HUMANITY.

Officer Erases Record of Deserter's Enlistment to Save Mother's Life.

Cincinnati, O., March 12.—To save his mother's life, the record of a boy's enlistment in the United States navy was erased by the local recruiting station in this city. The young man is Lee Waterford, whose parents reside at Latonia, Ky. He enlisted at the local recruiting office of March 1, but failed to show up for duty by the next morning. He was in charge of the recruiting office in Norfolk, Va., and was proclaimed a deserter.

Yesterday he was arrested by the local police and brought to the recruiting office. His father accompanied him and pleaded with Lieut. Wortman, in charge of the recruiting office to release the boy.

He said Lee was 17 years old and that he enlisted without consulting his parents. He had since been detained at home as a deserter to his mother, who is critically ill. If he is taken from her and sent to sea, the father said, it would kill her. Lieut. Wortman decided that in order to save the mother's life the younger man should be restored to his parents and the record of his enlistment erased.

CHINA IS ABOUT TO TAKE A CENSUS

Washington, March 12.—China is about to take a census of the uncounted millions within her borders. The state department has just received word of an imperial edict issued in accordance with the program for constitutional reform, directing an enumeration of individuals and families within the empire.

The returns for the census for families must be completed by 1919 and for individuals by 1922. All those living in foreign lands must be enumerated.

KILLED IN A FIGHT OVER TERRIER DOG

Hot Springs, Ark., March 12.—William Garrett of Portland, Ore., was killed last night by Harry English in a fight over a small terrier dog. The principals were strangers. Garrett's pet dog grabbed the trousers leg of English, a hotelkeeper, and English kicked the dog. A fistfight followed, in which Garrett was killed. The body of the dog was found in the street, producing confusion of the police. He died an hour later.

MICHIGAN FORESTS.

Fires in Them Last Year Caused Loss Estimated at \$28,502,697.

Lansing, Mich., March 12.—Before the senate committee on forestry in this city yesterday Carl E. Schmidt of Detroit, presented a report of a report of Messrs. Brandfield and Wynne, United States forestry experts, who investigated the effects of last October's forest fires in northern Michigan. The experts estimated the loss at \$28,502,697. This includes timber destroyed and money spent in fighting

CARNEGIE FOUNDATION.

University of Michigan and Agricultural College Want to Get In.

Lansing, Mich., March 12.—Both the University of Michigan and Ann Arbor and the Michigan agricultural college at Lansing, are applicants for the benefits of the Carnegie Foundation fund for the pensioning of retired professors. Both houses of the state legislature yesterday passed a resolution directing the state board of agriculture to apply for the pensioning for the agricultural college and a similar application made by the board of regents in behalf of the university was approved by the house of the legislature several weeks ago.

JAPAN PREPARING TO RECEIVE RUSSIAN WARSHIPS

Victoria, B. C., March 12.—News was brought by the steamer Saverio, which reached port yesterday that when the vessel called Japan was preparing to receive the first Russian warships to reach Japanese waters since the war. They are the Korietz and Glyak, now being named after two sunk during the war. They were built by the cruiser Shirovich and later by the battleships Pavel III, Delbui and one other, all of 17,000 tons which are to replace the Russian, far eastern squadron lost during the war.

CHINA'S NAVY.

Attempt to Restore It at Cost of \$100,000,000.

Victoria, B. C., March 12.—Advice received from Peking by the steamer Saverio tell of efforts to restore the navy of China at a cost of \$100,000,000. Admiral Sa had been summoned to Peking to consult with the British and French naval experts, who are to provide funds. Naval ports and docks are to be established, foreign experts engaged as advisers and instructors and a naval college established. A naval board has been appointed, consisting of Princes Su and Taishu, Cheung, who commanded the Peking squadron, are to work out the details.

CHICAGO PHYSICIANS HAVE FORMED A UNION

Chicago, March 12.—Chicago physicians have formed a union—an amalgamated organization identical to the plumbers' union.

Dr. Henry F. Lewis of the Chicago Medical society, vouches for this statement. In a communication to the physicians' club he declared that many members of the medical fraternity who publicly hold up their hands in "holy horror" at the thought of division of fees, themselves secretly participate in the practice.

"I do not believe they are clonewhore," he declared. "Why should we condemn any man for making such an arrangement with a brother physician or with a surgeon? One physician bills us for \$5,000 for collected by him from a millionaire patient who had spent \$10,000 in a single night's treatment. Do you believe it could have been secured or maintained for that physician to have consulted with the attending surgeon on the size of the fee? I do not think so. It would have been perfectly proper, in my opinion, for the doctor to have made out one bill and divided afterward or to have sent in their respective bills after an accounting between them had been made."

"Why should medical professions have a standard of ethics so different from that maintained by lawyers, architects or preachers?"

DELUGE OF BILLS FOR SPECIAL SESSION

Washington, March 12.—The deluge of bills introduced at the opening of each session of Congress promises to be as great for the special session which will begin next Monday as for the regular sessions, despite the prospect that little legislation other than the tariff will receive consideration. Five hundred bills were today presented to the clerk by the Senate and the House. All of them were introduced at the last session and many have been re-introduced year after year. Their presentation in advance of introduction gives the clerks an opportunity to record them in the regular way.

It is claimed that the number of bills

introduced at a session has increased over 25 per cent in the last five years. Members at the beginning of each session are accustomed to re-introduce the unsuccessful bills which have been offered in the preceding session.

JUDGMENT AGAINST AMERICAN SUGAR CO.

New York, March 12.—United States district court yesterday rendered the final judgment against the American Sugar Refining company for \$124,441, which includes the penalties imposed for false weighing and the expense of the recent suit won by the federal government. In connection with the case William Loeb, Jr., the new collector of customs at this port, issued a statement saying that he had ordered a re-weighing of the duties of the entries of the American Sugar Refining company from the time of the formation of the company, Dec. 1, 1901, down to the discovery of the fraud.
