which Mrs. Lewis told the Chicago police had been killed in a Kansas corn field, was born in this city last May. Shortly after the birth of the child Mrs. Lewis started for Scranton, Missouri, to visit a sister. When at Kansas City the child was taken ill and the mother wired to her husband in Ogden and he left the next day for Kansas City. When they returned neither spoke of the death of the child and would always attempt to explain the explanation of the cause of the infant's death.

Lewis for a number of years was bell-boy at the Union Pacific hotel in this city and was popular with the traveling public. It was while Addison McDonald, an orphan from Kansas was working as a pantry maid at the hotel that Lewis met her and the two went to Salt Lake where they claim they were married. Shortly after being married and after living in a number of rooming houses the couple went to the residence of Mrs. J. J. Coats on Lincoln avenue and secured rooms. They still retained the rooms after they both returned from Kansas where their child died. It was while at this house that Jacob Savitsky, a young Russian Jew the same as Lewis, called at the house several times and was with Lewis most of the time.

According to the statement made to the press representatives and police yesterday by Mrs. Coats, Lewis mistreated his wife terribly and would beat her without the slightest provocation and on divers occasions threatened to kill her. Also on one occasion Mrs. Coats stated that Lewis was beating his wife when Mr. Coats started to interfere and Lewis turned on him with a revolver and threatened him. On more than one occasion Lewis was admonished by the police to desist from beating of his wife or he would be arrested.

Mrs. Coats further stated that the Lewises became so troublesome and caused the other roomers to complain that they had to order the Lewises out of their rooms. Some of the roomers at the house stated prior to the departure from the city of the Lewises that they had killed their baby while in the east. A complete investigation is being made by the local police and what can be

learned will be communicated to the Chicago authorities.

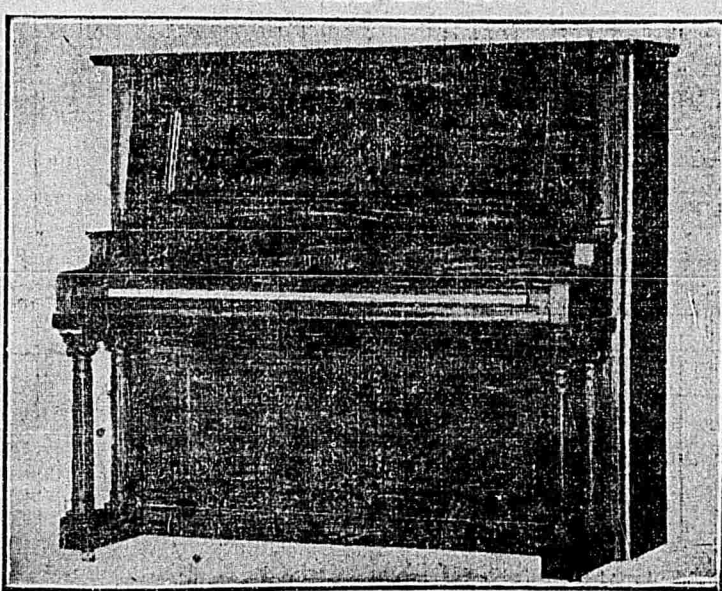
