it was not material whether these two bills should be made one or not, but he considered such legislation necessary, for parties had abused the exemption laws and had used its provisions to avoid paying their just debts, and in some cases in his district had used it to fight their employers, and in some instances sheriffs had charged mileage in serving payers sent by them from Beaver by mail, frem Beaver to the place in their county where they had served the process thus working great injustice. UTAH LEGISLATURE.

January 16.

The report of the Territorial Auditor was reconsidered and referred to the committee on revenue, with instructions to inquire why the other judicial districts had not reported as required by law.

Councilor E. Snow presented a bill for an act to amend section 1,444 of the Compiled Laws of Utah, changing the exemption of personal earnings of a debtor for sixty days next preceding the levy to the sum of fifty dollars. The bill was read and referred to the committee on judiciary.
