

investigate, and if possible to get them relieved of that complication, by an addition to their reservation on the south. There are some few restive spirits among this tribe, but I am well satisfied that the great majority of them are for peace, and the reason is quite obvious, for they have all to lose and nothing to gain, and they see and fully appreciate that fact.

The extreme severity and long duration of the winter, I believe, is without precedent, so say, at least, the oldest inhabitants, the mercury, for days at a time, sinking as low as twelve below the freezing point.

Then we have had terrible storms of rain, so much so that we have with difficulty saved the houses. The corral walls, having been built for the most part without stone foundations, have from the excessive moisture toppled over. The storm continues with unabated fury, with what final result we cannot as yet foresee. *—New Mexican.

That Investigation Veto.

Gov. George L. Woods, whom Mr. Grant first insulted and then made Governor of Utah, has vindicated his consistency. According to dispatches published this morning, he has vetoed a memorial passed by the Utah Legislature asking Congress to send out an investigating committee to inquire into the management of Territorial matters by those having charge. The reasons for this Executive veto of a request for investigation are not very clearly set forth, save this: That Woods don't think it would look well to join in condemning his own official acts. We fear that the Executive is disposed to be unnecessarily sensitive about his consistency. It is quite certain that there is nothing that reflects unfavorably upon him in consenting to an investigation into the conduct of Territorial officers in Utah. The fact that he is one of those officers, so far from excusing the Governor for vetoing the memorial, makes the act a most indecent and indecent one. The more that the proposition to investigate seems to reflect upon the Governor, the more should that officer feel constrained, by every consideration consistent with his innocence, and honorable to his manhood, to consent to the investigation. Not only should he consent to, but he should urge it. A rule established by practice and justified by public opinion requires any officer charged with official misconduct to immediately demand an investigation. The person accused is expected to be the mover in a matter of inquiry. George L. Woods' modesty is outrageously and indecently thin.

What is stated about lawlessness in Utah and the impossibility under existing laws of impanelling juries and administering law has nothing to do that we can see with the question of inquiry. The appointment of a committee by Congress certainly can not place new obstacles in the way of the administration of justice; it can not add to the insecurity of life or property, or in any way jeopardize the interests of the people, and the message, in so assuming, seriously accuses the intelligence or honesty of Congress. The veto message furnishes the strongest argument so far presented for the investigation.

To citizens of Oregon Woods' conduct will not appear strange. He was Governor of this State for four years. His administration was not only profligate, but corrupt. The Governor went into the landaulet business to the tune of \$600; all the departments of the State Government were active with private speculation and reeking with rottenness. The Governor was very much afraid of investigation then, and caused his friends in the Legislature to disrupt that body by resigning. The Legislature succeeding, did, however, investigate, and the result of that investigation justifies what we have here said of Woods' administration in Oregon.

Woods has reasons for disliking investigations, and he has never failed to do his utmost to prevent them. He is, therefore, perfectly consistent in vetoing the memorial of the Utah Legislature.—Portland, Oregon, Evening News.

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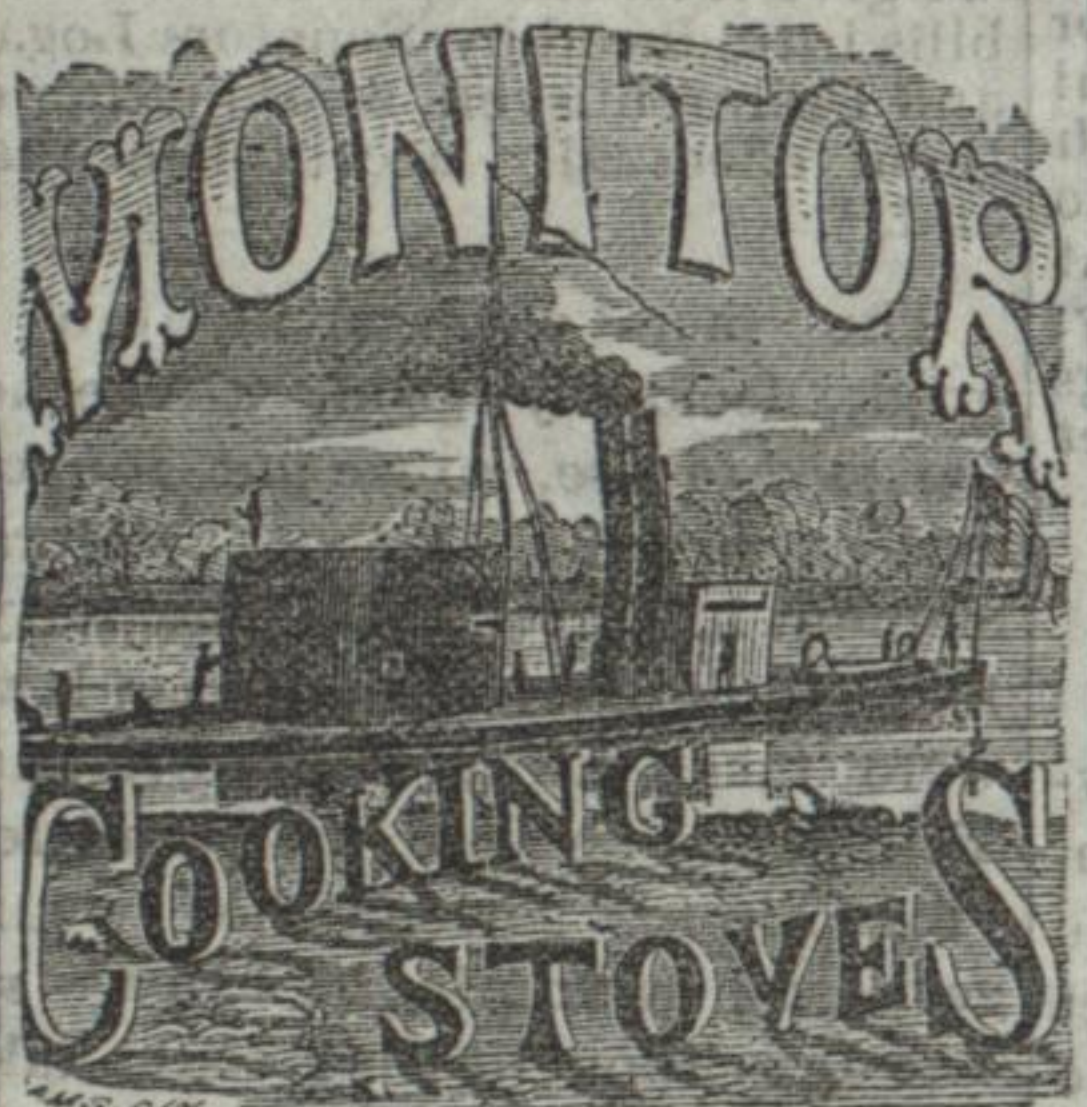
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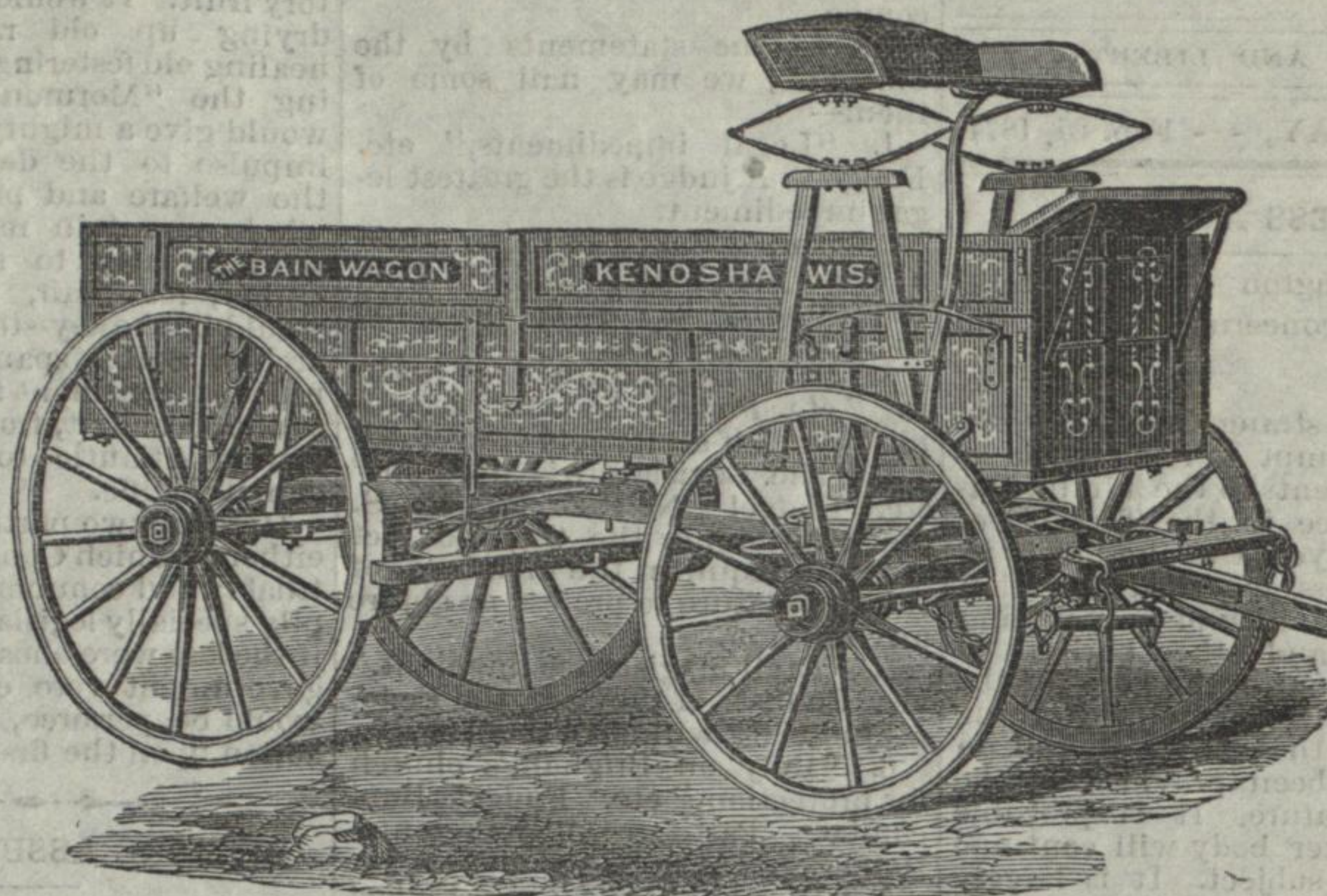

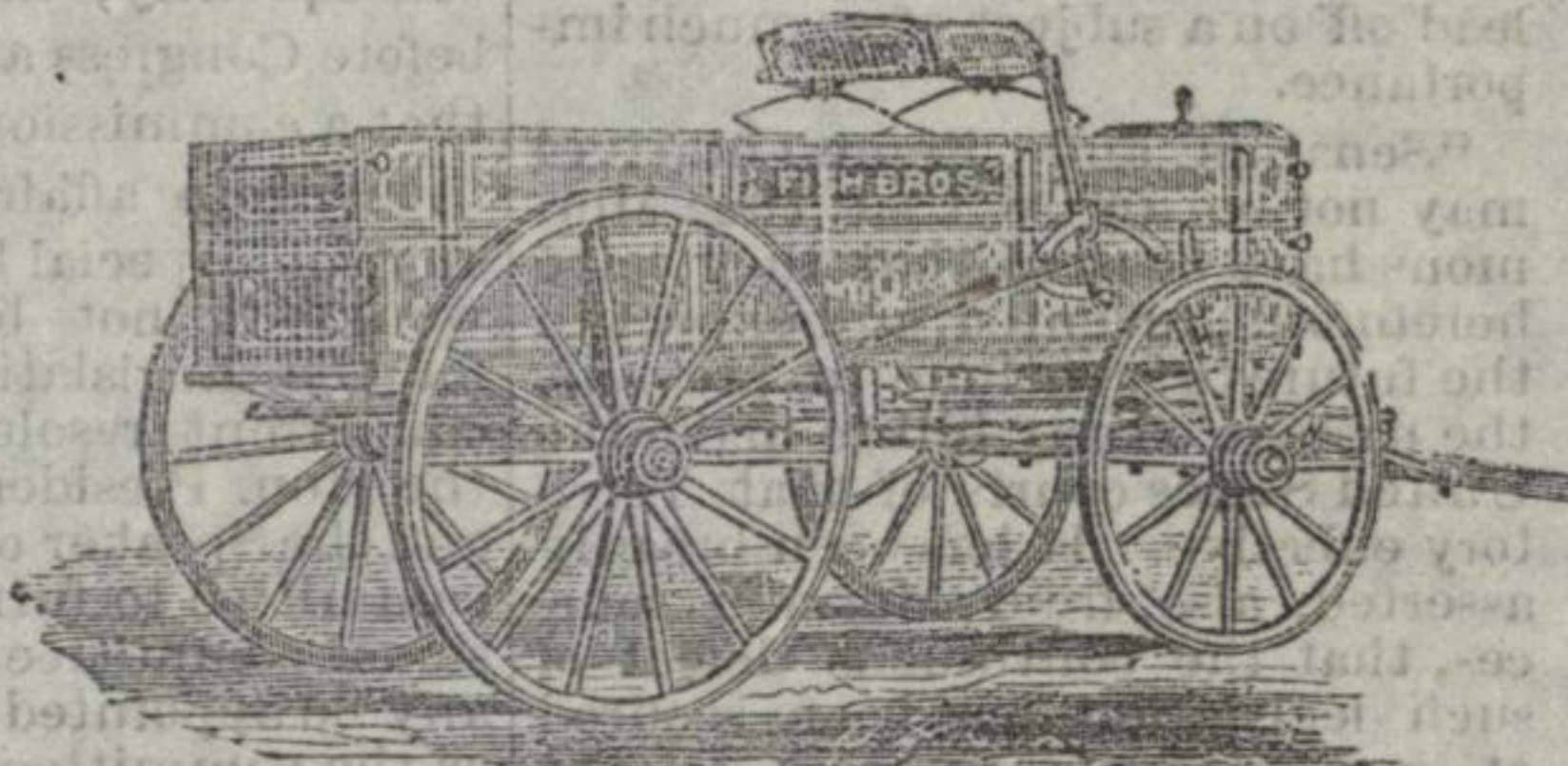
