To Move Weather Factory—The U. S. weather bureau will remove from the Doody building to the Boston block the last week in June, under a five years' lease.

Good Price for Big Clip—W. N. McGill of Nevada, now in this city, says that the wool clip this spring was unusually heavy and of fine quality. Good prices were secured.

Mrs. Johnson's Lecture—Mrs. Marie Johnson will lecture this evening before the Social Science club in thirty hall on "The Development of Capitalism and its Inevitable Collapse."

More Poles Coming Down—The Utah Light & Railway company is setting up trolley standards along west South Temple street, preparatory to removing the poles from that thoroughfare.

Speedy Elevators—The elevators in the Newhouse buildings are speedy affairs. It is claimed that they can make the round trip from the ground floor to the top in less than one second, the height being 11 stories.

Brandy Heads the List—Collector Greenwald of the Salt Lake custom house reports an increasing business, the heaviest consignments from "over the pond" being cognac brandy from La Belle France.

Plans for Schoolhouse—Architects Watkins & Birch completed plans for three 4-room school buildings to cost \$8,000 each, to be located at Rowley, Tremont and Riverside.

Will Post Officials—Chief Probation Officer Guardello Brown left this morning to make a tour of inspection over the Third juvenile court district. He expects to take up the juvenile court law with the constables in the different towns and cities and explain the requirements of the law.

He is going for the purpose of visiting relatives and securing a medical education, and will probably spend several months abroad.

Pass Law Examination—E. H. Burgess, L. L. Pratt, M. H. Wright, John Dow Wagener, Joseph C. Cecil, and E. L. Painequist of Salt Lake and Chase Hatch of Heber City passed the examination for admission to the state bar, which was held last week. The examination committee was composed of E. A. Walker, Bennett C. Smith and Charles Baldwin.

Hunting Statistics—Assistant Postmaster Lon Koster was busily engaged today looking over this year's files of the newspapers, securing information about the hunting season and the buildings now under way etc. with the view of presenting it to the special agent who will shortly reach the city to investigate the demand for more carriers, and a more effective delivery service.

Plans Wait Approval—Estimates of the cost of reconstruction of the Murray street car line, have been filed with President Bancroft of the Utah Light & Railway company, and as soon as he has approved of them the work will begin without delay. The double track connections on Ninth South street across State have been laid, and the Waterloo cars will run that way on change of schedule.

Blind Association Meets—Twenty-five of the blind of this city, and their friends, assembled at the home of S. W. Jenkins, 287 11th street, last evening to spend a social evening. The occasion was marked by the utmost good feeling. A musical program was arranged, after which refreshments were served. When the time came for going home all of those present left with gratitude in their hearts to Mr. Jenkins, who is president of the Western association of the blind, for the pleasure afforded.

Elaborate Finishing—There is some elaborate work being done on the interior finishing of the large banking apartment on the ground floor of a Newhouse building, especially in the ornamental plastering on the ceiling and pillars. By a new process, mottled marble effect is made on the hard white plaster. Paris piers, so that on being polished, there is no discerning the difference between the plaster and actual marble except on close inspection. The arrangement for incandescent lamps on the ceiling is elaborate, calculating to produce some beautiful effects, particularly when the ceilings have been frescoed.

NEW TIME CARD IS ANNOUNCED

Oregon Short Line Makes Several Changes in Its Passenger Schedule.

SLEEPERS FOR LOGAN PEOPLE

First Pullman Service Since Change in Main Line to Cache—Overland Limited Leaves at 2:25 p. m.

The time card committee of the Oregon Short Line, consisting of the superintendents of the various divisions of the road, has completed its labors and the new time card to go into effect on May 16 has been made up. In addition to the changes heretofore noted, there will be three trains daily to Logan under the new schedule, one of which will carry a sleeping car, the first Pullman service enjoyed by Logan passengers of the road since the changing of the main line to the western side of Cache Valley. This train leaves Salt Lake at 11 p. m. There will also be two trains daily on the line between Minidoka and Buhl, on the Twin Falls branch.

The overland limited train will leave Salt Lake under the new schedule at 2:25 p. m. No change is made in the arrival and departure of the Los Angeles limited, on the Salt Lake route. There will be two trains daily to Butte, three to California, points, four for eastern points and three for Portland. The new schedule is as follows:
