FRAGMENTS.

The City Council holds its regular session to-night.

The grand jury of the First District is now in session at Provo.

The assessment roll will be approved by the City Fathers to-night.

Mrs. LIEBIE E. CARPENTER, recently of Kansas City, Mo., is suing in the Third District Court for divorce from her husband, Wm. E. Carpenter, and for the care and keeping of their two children. She alleges against him wilful neglect to provide, and false accusations affecting her moral character.

The choir of the Fifth Ward arranged a surprise party on their leader, Mr. George Clark, last evening, and spent several hours very pleasantly at his residence, whither they went to the number of about forty, with well filled picnic baskets and a handsome plush album on a silver-plated stand as a present to their surprised instructor.

An attachment suit has been instituted in the Third District Court by Parke, Lacy & Co. against the Frisco Con. Mining Co. and Chicago Concentrating and Smelting Co., at Lehigh, Kan., and in consequence thereof the mill and mine were closed down yesterday. The suit is brought to recover \$1,428.79, alleged to be due for goods and merchandise sold and delivered.

LOCAL NEWS.

"Very Peculiar."—In its very excellent report of the meeting held in the South District, last night, the Herald prints the two following names, not more than two inches apart, viz: Louis Biggel, Louis Reggel. They evidently have two proof readers down there "who withhold their confidence from each other."

The Emigrants.—The Utah Central people say they could not get word from the emigrants yesterday, which indicated that they had not reached Green River. However, this morning a dispatch was received which stated that they would probably reach Ogden at 6 p.m. to-day. If this is correct there will scarcely be time to transfer in time for the regular 6.30 express to this city to-night, and they will probably come down to-morrow morning.

Later word is to the effect that the Bishops have been instructed to provide for the newcomers in Ogden to-night, and they will not come to this city till to-morrow morning.

Commendable.—The deacons of the Sugar House Ward can do more than meet the meeting house in order. On Friday, the 12th, James McGhie, Jr., Jacob Gibson and William Hansen, and others of the quorum to the number of eight or ten, got teams and wagons, together and started for the canyon to "set wood for the poor, also for the family of one of the ward missionaries in England. On their return the wagon was given to the most needy and poor man, Wm. W. W. family above mentioned. It is also in contemplation to finish this act of kindness by the boys getting to, rather, some of these days, and cutting "the wood."

Fearful Accident.—William Swift, a resident of the 1st Ward, while out rabbit hunting near the Draper, Sunday afternoon, met with a terrible misfortune in the accidental discharge of his double-barreled shot gun, which loads from which passed thru his left forearm, blowing away the bone and leaving his hand hanging by a shred of skin. He was standing with his arm over the muzzle of his piece, and the bullet slipped off and both locks catching against something, the gun went off, with the result described. He was brought to the city and Drs. Benedict and Fowler amputated the shattered member a little above the wrist.

Violators of Law.—The attention of the Fish and Game Commissioners of Utah County is called to the fact that some party or parties in that region are violating the law in catching and selling trout of too small size. A gentleman interested in the preservation and propagation of the trout fisheries of his property, near a body of water of last evening, varying in size from six or seven inches up to ten, many of which, as will be conceded, could not have been caught in a two inch mesh net, and certainly were not captured with a hook and line. Such a policy is a very shortsighted one, and will, if pursued, result in incalculable loss to the section where it is allowed to go on.

Attention, ye Investors.—The Mayor of the city has received a rather voluminous document, emanating from the headquarters of the International Inventions Exhibition to be held next year in the Royal Horticultural Gardens, South Kensington, London, giving a full description of the nature of the exhibition, the articles which will be received, etc., the design being "to bring vividly before the public the progress which has been made during the last quarter of a century in applying the discoveries of science to the purposes of daily life." The whole affair will be under the patronage of Her Majesty the Queen, with the Prince of Wales as President. There will be two divisions, the first being devoted to inventions, that is, apparatus, appliances, processes and products, invented or brought into use since 1855. The second division will consist of examples of material progress of a date not earlier than the commencement of the present century. Applications from foreign countries and the colonies will be received up to the 1st of November, and printed forms for these applications for space, name, address and description of exhibit accompany the document sent to the Mayor.

SAT DOWN ON.

THE LIBERAL "BROTHERS OF EDUCATION" OPPOSE THE BUILDING OF A SCHOOL-HOUSE, AND ARE OUTVOTED BY "IGNORANT AND UNCULTURED MORMONS" WHO FAVOR IT.

A characteristic school meeting, characteristic in that it gave each party the opportunity of showing exactly where it stands on the question of education, was held in the Seventh School district last evening, pursuant to a call of the Trustees. The object of the meeting was to determine whether or not a tax of one percent on the taxable property of the district should be levied for the purpose of building a new and bigger school-house, a thing much needed in the district, to accommodate its numerous and growing school population.

The meeting was called to order at half-past 7 o'clock by Isaac M. Waddell, one of the Trustees, who nominally acted for chairman, David McKendall, who was elected by a vote of 105 yeas to 35 noes, the "Liberals" struggling with all their little strength to put F. M. Bishop, one of their party, in the chair, but failing for lack of numbers. David James, one of the People's Party, then nominated B. G. Baybould, one of the trustees and a "Liberal," for secretary, and he was elected almost unanimously. On motion, Wm. McEachlan, James Anderson and David James, the second named a "Liberal," were then appointed tellers by the chairman. As soon as the organization was complete, the meeting, on motion of one of the "Liberals," was adjourned to the meeting-house, in order to accommodate the attendance, which had become quite crowded.

Mr. Waddell then stated the object of the assembly, and informed those present that the number of children of school age in the district was 373, and that only 200 could be properly accommodated under existing circumstances. The trustees thought that one percent would be a sufficient tax to build the school house desired, as the taxable property was assessed at \$400,000, which would give \$4,000 for the purpose, and they therefore recommended that the tax be levied.

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
