

## PUT ORDINANCE INTO A DEEP SLEEP

But Small Prospects for Passing  
Of Purchasing Agent's  
Measure.

LIGHT FRANCHISE ACCEPTED.

Contractors Make Demand for Money  
And Threaten Suit—To Pave South  
Temple to Tenth East Street.

The city council last night reconsidered its former action in passing the ordinance purchasing agent ordinance, and after some little discussion the ordinance was referred to the committee on municipal laws, and it is now understood that the measure will remain in the committee's hands and never be resurrected again. President Hewlett called Councilman Hobday to the chair and then made the motion to reconsider the ordinance. The motion was carried by a unanimous vote.

The question then arose as to the proper method of killing the ordinance as it appeared that no one would stand sponsor for it. Hewlett and Black both moved that the enacting clause be stricken out. Assistant City Attorney Harnett stated that an ordinance once passed could not be reconsidered, and suggested that the only legal way to put the ordinance out of business was to send it to the mayor, who, he stated, would veto it on the ground that the salary was too high. Fernstrom and several others thought it could be referred to the committee and pigeonholed. Upon the latter motion it was referred to the committee on municipal laws.

Cloudy for Officer Smoot.

The suspension of Police Officer Smoot for five days by Chief Lynch for conduct unbecoming an officer, was the subject of quite a heated discussion at the meeting and the matter will be further investigated by the police and prison committee on Wednesday evening. When the report from the committee sustaining Chief Lynch was read Hobday offered an amendment that the suspension of Officer Smoot be made permanent, and that the chief be instructed to discharge him. Hobday made a lengthy talk on the matter in which he stated the charges against Smoot, and said that his conduct was a blot on the good reputation of the police department and that the officer should be discharged.

Fernstrom raised a point of order against the amendment to the effect that the city council had no right to make the suspension of the officer permanent or to remove an officer, that being the prerogative of the mayor or the chief. Hobday then offered another amendment that the chief or the mayor be requested to ask for Smoot's resignation. After some what of a mix-up between Fernstrom and Hobday as to the statement made by Officer Smoot during the investigation, the report of the committee was laid over for one week upon the request of two councilmen with the understanding that the matter would be considered again by the committee on Wednesday evening.

SOLD PRISONER'S GUN.

The charge against Smoot was that he arrested a man on the night of July 3 for shooting off a revolver on the corner of Second South and East Temple streets, and instead of taking him to the police station he took the revolver away from him and took his name and told him to report to the station the next morning and he was not called for he got it back from the sergeant several days later and sold it to a colored boot-black for \$5. The boot-black found that the gun was worth \$1.50, so he demanded his money back and it was returned to him. The matter was then reported to Chief Lynch and Smoot was then suspended.

FRANCHISE ACCEPTED.

The Utah Light & Railway company by President Joseph P. Smith notified the council of the acceptance of the franchise granted it at the meeting last Thursday evening. The communication stated that the company would in due season file the proper conveyances and releases together with a complete abstract of title to the water rights and other property described in the ordinance.

CONTRACT DEMAND.

The Rudolph S. Blome company made another demand for the balance of \$25,000 claimed to be due for the construction of the cement sidewalks in long past due and the letter stated that unless the city paid the sum by Saturday, Aug. 12, suit would be commenced to collect it. Certain members of the council claim that the sidewalks are defective in a number of places and hence the bill for the balance has been held up. The matter was referred to the engineering and engineering committees for consideration and it is probable that the matter will be settled before Saturday.

THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS ASKED

authority to let the contract for paving South Temple street from Seventh to Tenth East street to P. J. Moran without the delay of advertising for bids. The communication stated that Mr. Moran would take the job at the figures under his present contract. By letting him do the work it would save a great deal of time and, as the city attorney has informed the board, that such action would be legal, the board asked authority to let the contract to Mr. Moran. The authority was granted. Later the council passed the ordinance laying an assessment on the abutting property for the paving.

MONEY FOR DOREMUS.

ADDITIONAL CLERK.

The finance committee reported in favor of allowing City Treasurer Harris an additional clerk in his office at a salary of \$80 per month to assist in handling the special tax collections. Martin offered an amendment that the clerk be hired for 90 days. Amendment was carried, and the report was adopted as amended.

WATER MAIN EXTENSION.

Fernstrom's resolution providing for a watermain extension on Third West street from between First and Second North to Seventh North at a cost of \$5,200 was taken out of the hands of the waterworks committee and was adopted. Chief Bywater stated that the extension was necessary in order to give fire protection to residents in that vicinity.

NEW FIRE STATION.

The report of the fire and finance committees, recommending that plans be prepared for the construction of a new fire station on the city's property at the corner of Tenth East and Ninth South streets at a cost of \$5,000, was adopted by the council, and \$200 was allowed for preparing the plans and specifications.

UTOHNS IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Aug. 4.—The 24th of July was celebrated in an appropriate manner by the Utah colony in the Latter-day Saint church, corner of Monroe and Paulina streets. Prof. A. B. Christensen of the Latter-day Saints' university was the orator of the occasion, and Elder George H. Thomas of Logan, who has just spent two years in missionary work in England, and who is now attending Chicago College of Music, furnished the music for the occasion.

Among the vocalists who rendered melodies on this occasion was Miss Nannie Toul of Utah, of whom the report says:

"The gem of the evening was undoubtedly the rendering of 'Y Deryn Pau' by Miss Nannie Toul, of the Royal College of Music. The distinguished young Welsh-American vocalist who has recently, on more than one occasion, been 'commanded' to sing before their majesties, Miss Toul, is a product of the Welsh Eisteddfod in Salt Lake City. She has a brilliant future before her."

Mr. Price, who was one of the guests, adds, that Nannie was highly complimented not only for her beautiful rendering of this air, but also for her very correct enunciation of the Welsh language. Among those who were specially delighted with our young songstress, and who were exceedingly courteous to the American Cambrians present, was Lord Tredegar, president of the society, and who, by the way, was one of the "six hundred" who survived the charge at Balaclava in the Crimean war.

"Nannie," he adds, "is to take a very prominent part in the National Eisteddfod at Mountain Ash on the 7th, 8th and 10th inst. She is to sing at intervals during the whole of the Eisteddfod, and besides this she is to lead the assembled throng in singing the national anthem, 'Hen Wlad y Nhadau.' On this she is also promised an ovation that will thrill her young heart."
