ON THE VERGE OF REBELLION.

Porto Ricans are Ready to Break Into Revolt.

TIED OF AMERICAN RULE.

People Want Local Self-Government, or Failing that, Entire Independence—Soldier Associated.

Chicago, March 10.—The Tribune will tomorrow print the following special correspondence from Porto Rico, from a Cuban correspondent:

San Juan de Porto Rico, March 1.—The situation in Porto Rico is not understood. People in the island generally regard Porto Rico as a sort of haven of peace. The war department has just requested of General Henry that he immediately remove how many regular troops he could spare from the island. The One Hundred and Forty-seventh New York regiment has been ordered to leave the island. The regular regiments that remain are so scattered that in many places where there is necessity for a strong force, only a company's guard can be mustered, and territories where there are continual mutinies and the greatest evidence of discontent at American rule are unguarded.

General Henry is in a dilemma. He has only three regiments of troops—the Eleventh cavalry, the Nineteenth and the Fifth infantry—and two batteries of the Fifth heavy artillery.

"I need indeed the troops I have," said the general at his residence in San Juan. "Because of the easy victory of our troops here in the war and the apparent friendliness of the natives to the American soldiers when they invaded the island, a nation exists in the States that there is little necessity for a strong force to maintain order in the island. The idea is erroneous.

The conditions here are alarming. These people have been given every opportunity, but they have thrown them aside. They are clamoring now for local self-government. They are no more fit for local self-government than I am to run a locomotive. More troops are needed in the island. The mode of discontented people here is to strike and are rapidly gaining, and can be kept down only by a strong military force.

The feeling between the natives and the American troops seems to grow more bitter every day. More troops are here to maintain the present situation, to prevent their men from striking vengeance on the natives, especially on the native police, for acts of violence that are continually committed against the troops.

BOLDLY MURDERED. At Cayago, a small town on the military road twenty-five miles from San Juan, a soldier of the Eleventh and Forty-seventh New York was murdered on Saturday night in a manner that indicates the true state of the natives. Private Michael Burke of company I had entered the Puerto Rico city and had secured the house of a native who had been told that a native soldier had been killed. Only four nights before the killing of Burke had the blood been shed in the streets and soldiers arrested in a brutal assault on Private Fitzpatrick. The native police, who were armed without a warrant, and when he resisted, beat him himself.

The condition of Porto since the outbreak of the soldiers and the native police, in which several soldiers were killed, has been furthering on open battle between the troops and the natives.

These are the reasons for the mutiny of General Henry's face look on a man that he knows that he is in the end days on the western plains as he contemplates his remarks about conditions in the island.

"I have given them too much time," he said. "Now I'm going to take in the clock."

Regiments Now at Manila Want to Stay Longer.

AND WHIP THE FILIPINOS.

May be Recalled for Another Six Months Service—Anxious to Balance the Account.

Washington, March 10.—One of the paragraphs of the army reorganization act contained authorization for the enlistment of volunteers for a period of six months to replace them by regular troops, in no case longer than six months. The question has been presented to the war department whether or not it was able under this provision to avail itself of the services of the officers of the volunteer regiments, as well as of enlisted men, until the latter could be recalled.

The law officers of the department have concluded that the volunteer regiments in the act were not in a broad sense and that, therefore, the president has authority to recall all the volunteer regiments now at Manila and other points in the Philippines into the service of the United States.
