### Verdict of Bates Jury-Husband Sues Wife.

Provo, Dec. 13 .- The jury in the Bates case came in yesterday afternoon at 4:50 o'clock with a verdlet finding defendant guilty of voluntary manslaughter. Sentence was set for Saturday, January 19th, 1901, and defendant was given to and including January 18th to file and serve notice of intention to move for a new trial, and the court stenographer was ordered to furnish lefendant with a transcript of the record in the case. The jury at first stood three for conviction of murder in the second degree, four for conviction of voluntary manslaughter, and five

for acquittal. penalty for voluntary manplaughter is from one to ten years' imprisonment in the State prison. The trial of the case has awakened great sympathy for the parties who have suffered from the deplorable affair, and the killing of Nordquist is a striking example of the evils wrought by the indulgence in intoxicants, it being evident to all who heard the case that if no liquor had been drank, the
