LOCAL BRIEFS.

COUNCIL SMILES AT HIGH COURT

Decision Affecting the Body's Position Ignored by Learned Aldermen.

TAKE JOB AWAY FROM PAT.

Decides To Do Water Main Adjustment as Emergency Work Under Holiday's Supervision.

The city council last evening held a special session for the purpose of deciding what to do in the matter of the First South street water mains. At the regular meeting Tuesday evening the subject came up under strong protest from Councilman O'Donnell against the engineering department going over the head of the council in letting a contract for the work of lowering the mains on the street, the councilman characterizing the action as placing the council in the light of a lot of "nipples" and showing equally great respect for the council members. It was reported then that the engineering department had awarded the contract for the work to Pat Moran to be done on a force schedule, as the work of paying is now beginning and it would be impossible, according to the department, to wait until bids could be advertised and the work done in the usual way. Moran offered to do the work for a sum considerably less than the contract price of the work, and was told to go ahead.

MAKE GREAT DISCOVERY.

Since that time, however, the engineering department found out that it had made an error, and that Moran had not been instructed to proceed, and a special meeting of the council became necessary. After discussing the matter for more than an hour, Asst. City Atty. P. J. Daly was asked for an opinion as to whether it would be legal for the council to undertake the work itself as "emergency" work. Mr. Daly quoted the supreme court decision to the effect that the powers originally conferred upon the council by statute in regard to contracting for public work were set aside and abrogated when the city created the board of public works, and that all public work now be awarded by that board and the award simply confirmed by the council. He stated it as his opinion that the council could not go behind this decision.

DECISION OVERLOOKED.

The council was apparently unconvinced, however, for a motion by Fernstrom that the superintendent of waterworks be instructed to lower the mains and change the contract, was carried, and the whole to be done as emergency work, and at a cost not to exceed \$12,000, was passed by unanimous vote.

Several committees of the city council held meetings after the special session of the council last evening. The finance committee in a brief session approved all of the contracts for sewer and paving work awarded by the board of public works a week ago.

The waterworks committee took up the matter of the Federal Pacific closing of Third and Fifth South streets and the occupying of more than half of Sixth West street by the Rio Grande Railway company. The committee decided to deposit \$14,000 to pay for the cost of the work, but to be reimbursed by the city in semi-annual installments of 25 per cent, the first installment to be paid Feb. 1, 1909.

CONSIDERS PROTEST.

The street committee heard protests from the sides about the proposed closing of Third and Fifth South streets and the occupying of more than half of Sixth West street by the Rio Grande Railway company. The committee decided to deposit \$14,000 to pay for the cost of the work, but to be reimbursed by the city in semi-annual installments of 25 per cent, the first installment to be paid Feb. 1, 1909.

SHEPARD'S APPEAL IN VAIN.

Well Known Salt Lake Book Dealer Must Serve Time.

Word has been received in this city that the application for a rehearing of the R. B. Shepard case has been denied by the circuit court of appeals. Shepard, a well known book and magazine man, was convicted by the federal court on a charge of using the mails for the purpose of telling where obscene literature might be obtained. A sentence to serve 15 months in the state penitentiary was imposed, and now that the last hope of having judgment set aside is gone, Shepard will be taken into custody when final papers are received in this city.
