Dear Mrs. Pinkham—
The treatment of the bill for abolition of the death penalty was the subject of general discussion in the lobbies of the council. The general impression is that the bill will require some modifications, the exact nature of which will be discussed at a session of the Constitutional Democratic assembly.

Premier Goraykin and all the members of the ministry except M. Stoyanoff were present at today's sitting of the council. The tone of their remarks tended to confirm the surmises that the fall of the ministry has been postponed on account of the refusal of the Constitutional Democrats to participate in a coalition cabinet. Premier Goraykin today reiterated in private conversation that he was anxious to retire.

The council of the empire today confirmed the resignation of all its members, though there was some question as to the validity of the decision of M. Oushakoff on account of his having been convicted and exiled to Siberia 40 years ago for participation in the first plot to assassinate Alexander II. M. Oushakoff subsequently was pardoned and changed his views, being now considered almost a reactionary.

The double meaning the government is adopting to counteract the revolutionary spirit among the workmen is illustrated by a proclamation issued today by the prefect of police of Moscow. While prohibiting under heavy penalty open-air meetings, the carrying of arms and the inciting of strikes, it orders employers of manual artisans, such as bakers, carpenters and shoemakers to introduce the 16-hour day instead of the 12-hour day, not require Sunday labor, and to improve the food and lodgings of employees, under the same penalties as are invoked against the workers.

Police activity against the "patriots" who are trying to incite anti-Jewish uprisings is reported from various sections of the country. The local authorities evidently have taken warning from the change in sentiment in official circles at St. Petersburg since publicity was given to the Blasiuski events. The policeman of Blasiuski who was caught firing the revolver shots which were ascribed to Jewish revolutionaries, precipitating a renewal of the massacre there, has been dismissed from the service. He pleaded that he was drunk at the time and had no intention of provoking a renewal of the excesses.

The projected visit of a deputation of the lower house to the interparliamentary conference at London probably will be abandoned. Representative men cannot be spared at present, and the leaders are afraid of the irresponsible utterances of "nether weights."

SITUATION IN EGYPT.

Sir Edward Gray Surprises Commons With a Sensational Speech.

London, July 5.—Parliament and the country were given a surprise tonight by a sensational speech by Sir Edward Gray, the foreign secretary, on the situation in Egypt. Interesting debate on foreign affairs has been anticipated when the house of commons today took up the foreign estimates, but on account of Russia and the Congo, rather than Egypt. Other subjects were, however, temporarily quieted when the house realized the momentous character of Sir Edward Gray's deliverance with regard to Egypt.

Speaking in a solemn tone and amid intense silence, the minister declared the recent attacks on British officers at Tantab were not accidental, but a deliberate manifestation of the fanatical spirit which has necessitated the strengthening of the garrison in Egypt, and declared that unless the authority of Lord Cromer and the Egyptian government was strongly upheld it might lead to a situation requiring the adoption of stern measures.

PEASANTS' UNIONS' CONGRESS.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—A meeting of the congress of Peasants' unions, representing 24 provinces, with delegates from the Social Revolutionaries and Labor parties and the Finnish Red Guard, was held in Helsingfors today.

The congress adopted a resolution to call a general rising if the parliament should be dissolved and to make all preparations for a revolution, but to wait for the signal from St. Petersburg.

SAILORS' PICKET SHOT.

San Francisco, July 5.—Charles Ohman, a picket of the sailors' union, was shot in the right arm about 1 o'clock this afternoon by an unknown man with whom he had an altercation a few hours before, when the stranger refused to quit work on the steamer Vanguard, unloading at Washington street wharf, Oakland.

Ohman had asked the stranger early

on to leave him alone, but the man would not do so, and in the altercation that followed Ohman admits striking him. Ohman, dressed in a sailor's uniform, had struck him, and then drew a revolver, fired and fled, with Ohman and several others in pursuit. He escaped. Ohman is not seriously injured.

YELLOW FEVER SPREADS.

New Orleans, July 5.—Incoming steamers continue to report cases of yellow fever at Central American and West Indian ports. The steamer Alps, which arrived at quarantine at last night, further reported today that Port Limon, Costa Rica, had two cases of yellow fever, and one death.

PEASANTS' ATTACK OFFICER.

Gomel, July 5.—The peasants of the village of Sultanova today attacked the superintendent of police and beat him almost to death. Troops have been dispatched to the village.

ICE TRUST SUED.

Little Rock, Ark., July 5.—Atty. Gen. Rogers filed suit against the Consumers' Ice company, C. I. Kraft's Ice company and the Retail Grocers' Ice company, under the antitrust law, alleging a combination to prevent competition. The attorney-general asks for an assessment of the penalty of \$5,000 against each for every day since March 25, or a total of \$5,000 against each company. Suits also were brought against Morris & Co., of New Jersey, for a penalty of \$1,000,000 and costs for alleged conspiracy.

TAFT TO VISIT WEST.

Washington, July 5.—Secty. Taft has determined to make a trip of inspection western next October to Fort Riley and Fort Leavenworth, as well as to Fort Sam Houston at San Antonio. His purpose is to examine these places with particular reference to the execution of the plans of the general staff for the creation of large brigade posts at these points.

It is likely that the secretary will also approve the establishment of such posts in America's West. Wash., D. C.
