

ABOLISHMENT OF DEATH PENALTY

Bill for it Subject of Discussion In Lobbies of Council of The Empire.

MINISTRY'S FALL POSTPONED

Will be no Deputation of Lower House To Interparliamentary Conference.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—The council of the empire spent the day discussing rules of order. The relative strength of the Reactionary and the Liberal wings was shown on the vote to deprive members of the right to present popular petitions, which proposition was rejected after a warm debate.

The treatment of the bill for abolition of the death penalty was the subject of general discussion in the lobbies of the council. The general impression is that the bill will require some modifications, the exact nature of which will be discussed at a session of the Constitutional Democratic assembly, here tomorrow.

There is much sentiment for the abolition of a measure restricting the practically unlimited right of governor generally to order offenders to be tried by military courts, allowing them to be done only in time of actual armed uprisings. This would tend to effect the same object, as the civil code provides the death penalty only in case of attempts on the life of the emperor or violation of the governing regulations.

Premier Stolypin and all the members of the ministry except M. Sudyakoff were present at today's sitting of the council. The tone of their remarks tended to confirm the surmise that the fall of the ministry has been postponed on account of the refusal of the Constitutional Democrats to participate in a coalition cabinet.

The council of the empire today confirmed the credentials of all its members, though there remains some question as to the validity of the election of M. Onshakoff on account of his having been convicted and exiled to Siberia 10 years ago for participation in the first plot to assassinate Alexander II. Mr. Onshakoff subsequently was pardoned and changed his views, being now considered almost a reactionary.

The domestic method the government is adopting to counteract the revolutionary spirit among the workmen is illustrated by a proclamation issued today by the prefect of police of Moscow. While prohibiting under heavy penalty open-air meetings, the carrying of arms and the inciting of strikes, it orders employers of manual artisans, such as bakers, carpenters and shoemakers, to introduce the 10-hour day instead of the 12-hour day, not require Sunday labor, and to improve the food and lodging of employees, under the same penalties as are invoked against the workmen.

Police activity against the "narodniks" who are trying to incite anti-Jewish uprisings is reported from various sections of the country. The local authorities evidently have taken warning from the change in sentiment in official circles at St. Petersburg since publication of the Bialystok events. The policeman of Bialystok who was caught firing the revolver shots which were ascribed to Jewish revolutionists, precipitating a renewal of the massacre there, has been discharged from the service. He pleaded that he was drunk at the time and had no intention of provoking a renewal of the excesses.

The projected visit of a deputation of the lower house to the interparliamentary conference at London probably will be abandoned. Representative men cannot be spared at present, and the leaders are afraid of the irresponsible utterances of "nether weights."

SITUATION IN EGYPT.

Sir Edward Grey Surprises Commons With a Sensational Speech.

London, July 5.—Parliament and the country were given a surprise tonight by a sensational speech by Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, on the situation in Egypt. Interesting debate on foreign affairs has been anticipated when the house of commons today took up the foreign estimates, but on account of Russia and the Congo, rather than Egypt. Other subjects were, however, temporarily shelved when the house realized the momentous character of Sir Edward Grey's delivery with regard to Egypt.

Speaking in a solemn tone and amid intense silence, the minister declared the recent attacks on British officers at Tantah were not accidental, but a deliberate manifestation of the fanatical spirit which has necessitated the strengthening of the garrison in Egypt, and declared that unless the authority of Lord Cromer and the Egyptian government was strongly upheld it might lead to a situation requiring the adoption of stern measures.

PEASANTS' UNIONS' CONGRESS.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—A meeting of the congress of Peasants' unions, representing 21 provinces, with delegates from the Social Revolutionary and Labor parties and the Finnish Red Guard, was held in Helsinki today.

The congress adopted a resolution to call a general meeting of the parliament should be dissolved and to make all preparations for a revolution, but to wait for the signal from St. Petersburg.

SAILORS' PICKET SHOT.

LEWIS S. CLARK DEAD.

New Orleans, July 5.—Lewis S. Clark, for eight years Republican national committee man from Louisiana, died suddenly at a hotel here early today of acute indigestion.

STORM AT CANNES.

Cannes, July 5.—A destructive cyclone swept over this section today and railway traffic has been stopped owing to the tracks being obstructed by uprooted trees. Many houses were ruined and many fishing smacks were dashed to pieces on the rocks. A brig was driven ashore, but the crew was saved. Many sailors have been injured.

SENT TO SIBERIA.

Moscow, July 5.—Maria Spiridonova, who killed Chief of Police Lushenofsky at Tansky, was today sent to Siberia with other prisoners. Spectators at the railway station here kept a stout heart, to which she replied: "We shall soon be back."

FORGERY OF CHECKS.

Chicago, Ill., July 5.—A large number of cashier's checks, payable on the Lumbermen's Exchange bank of Cairo, Ill., have been sent here for collection.

ICE TRUST SUED.

Little Rock, Ark., July 5.—Atty.-Gen. Rogers today filed suits against the "Commonwealth Ice Company," C. L. Krafts Ice company and the Retail Grocers' Ice company, under the anti-trust law, alleging a combination to prevent competition. The attorney-general asks for an assessment of the penalty of \$5,000 against each for every day since March 25, or a total of \$45,000 against each company. Suits were also brought against Morris & Co., of New Jersey, for a penalty of \$1,112,000 and costs for alleged conspiracy.

TACT TO VISIT WEST.

Washington, July 5.—Secy. Taft has determined to make a trip of inspection westward next October to Fort Riley and Fort Leavenworth, and thence to Fort Sam Houston at San Antonio. His purpose is to examine these places with particular reference to the execution of the plans of the general staff for the creation of large brigade posts at these points.

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Ill., have been sent here for collection the last few days. There is no Lumbermen's Exchange bank in Cairo. MRS. TANNER'S FUNERAL.

That of Wife of Commander-in-Chief G. A. R. Held in Washington.

Washington, July 5.—The funeral of Mrs. Tanner, wife of James Tanner, commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., who was killed in an automobile accident at Helena, Mont., last week, was held here today. Rev. John Van Schaick, pastor of the Universalist church, officiated. The body was interred in the National cemetery at Arlington.

Floral tributes in large numbers were sent to the house, among them a handsome wreath from President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

BORGES SENTENCED.

Ubers Plantation Promoter Gets From Twelve to Fifteen Years.

Boston, July 5.—Ferdinand E. Borges, formerly of Boston and one of the promoters of the Ubers Plantation company, was today sentenced to serve from 12 to 15 years in state prison for larceny and conspiracy by Judge White, in the superior criminal court.

Borges was convicted on 23 counts of larceny and one of conspiracy in connection with the affairs of the Ubers company. He was indicted with former Congressman William D. Owen of Indiana, who has not yet been arrested.

CLEVELAND GIVES UP TRIP BECAUSE HE IS SICK.

Chicago, July 5.—A telegram was received here tonight stating that former President Grover Cleveland was sick at his home in Princeton and would be unable to come west tomorrow, as he had intended.

Mr. Cleveland and James H. Eckles, former controller of the currency, had planned a fishing trip in Wisconsin, but Mr. Eckles was notified tonight that Mr. Cleveland would be unable to keep the engagement on account of illness. The telegram did not state the nature of Mr. Cleveland's illness.

BRYAN VISITS PARLIAMENT.

London, July 5.—William J. Bryan was an interested visitor to the house of commons this afternoon as the guest of John Burns, president of the local government board, who introduced Mr. Bryan to a number of British politicians.

INFORMATION FILED AGAINST ROCKEFELLER.

Findlay, O., July 5.—Prosecutor David of Hancock county filed information here today in the probate court against the Standard Oil company and John D. Rockefeller, charging that in 1882 Rockefeller combined individual partnership corporations into the Standard Oil company, the purpose being to monopolize the production, sale and transportation of crude petroleum and its by-products.

This, it is alleged, was a conspiracy against trade and a violation of the anti-trust law. The Standard's attorneys filed a motion to the effect that the probate court had no jurisdiction. Judge Barker overruled the motion and decided that his court had jurisdiction.

Every attempt was made by the attorneys for the defense to have the decision reserved for a month, but Judge Barker was firm.

E. R. HAWKINS & CO. FAIL.

Philadelphia, July 5.—Alden H. Weed and Thomas J. McAvoy, trading as E. R. Hawkins & Co., manufacturers of woolen goods, were today declared voluntary bankrupts in the United States district court. Liabilities are given as \$244,000 and the assets as \$252,000.

ORE WENT TO BOTTOM.

Tacoma, Wash., July 5.—While the steamer Al-Ki was discharging at the Tacoma smelter last evening a part of a dock collapsed and \$9,000 worth of ore from Treadwell, Alaska, went to the bottom of the bay. It may be partially recovered with a dredger.

MONSIGNOR HANSON DEAD.

St. Louis, July 5.—Monsignor Jos. Hanson, aged 76 years, rector of St. John of Nepomuk's church, and one of the most eminent Catholic clergymen in America, died yesterday after an illness of three years, due to a nervous malady. He founded the Nepomuk parish, one of the strongest Bohemian parishes in the United States, and established the Bohemian Mass, the first Bohemian mass in this country. In July, 1896, he was given the title of monsignor.

WITNESSES WERE SLAIN.

Kars, Transcaucasia, July 5.—The decapitated bodies of seven Mussulmen who had been summoned to appear as witnesses at the investigation into the inter-racial troubles, were found this morning outside the fortress. It is feared this will provoke reprisals against Armenians.

CAPT. COWGILL DEAD.

Unhams, O., July 5.—Capt. Thomas C. Cowgill, there on a meeting of the house of representatives, and once a senator, died very suddenly at his home near Kenard last night.

YELLOW FEVER SPREADS.

New Orleans, July 5.—Incoming steamers continue to report cases of yellow fever at Central American and West Indian ports. The steamer Alps, which arrived at quarant as last night, further reported today that Port Limon, Costa Rica, had two cases of yellow fever, and one death.

PEASANTS ATTACK OFFICER.

Gomez, July 5.—The peasants of the village of Sultana today attacked the superintendent of police and beat him almost to death. Troops have been dispatched to the village.

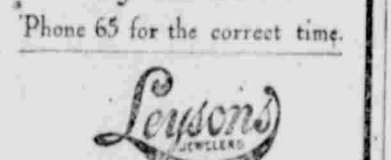
