HERMAN RIDDER MAKES AN APPEAL TO PRESIDENT

New York, July 13.—"Not only are the paper makers keeping their own employees in idleness, but they are enforcing idleness upon thousands of workers in printing and publishing plants throughout the country." This conclusion, Herman Ridder, president of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, expressed in a letter addressed to the president about paper combinations.

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The letter states that the promise that the courts would provide an adequate and prompt remedy, after an appeal to Congress for relief had failed, has not been fulfilled; that after 2 paper companies, acting together in the Elfre & Manilla association, had been subjected to investigation by the federal grand jury, the paper makers admitted that they had placed their interests beyond their reach, but subsequently all but two of the participants pleaded guilty, and that immunity was practically granted to every individual who participated in the pool. The treasurer and originator of the pool, John H. Pearce, is now a fugitive in Europe. He was included in the indictment.

The situation, the letter concludes, requires drastic treatment and the appeal is made that steps be taken to bring the lawbreakers to their senses, and to end a lawless condition which interferes with a return to prosperity.

HONDURAN FORCES RE-CAPTURE TOWN OF GRACIAS

Washington, July 13.—Official advice which reached the state department today confirm the press reports that the Honduran government forces have recaptured the small town of Gracias, which they are about to move to the more important city of Choluteca. To this extent the government forces appear to have the advantage. On the other hand, Honduras is menaced from the northern border. On the Occidentals, however, there are continually reiterated reports of an attack on Puerto Cortez, while Gen. Lee Charatman, whom the state department officials style a soldier of fortune, is reported in the country just a few miles from Puerto Cortez. The state department is in one of the dispatches as being on a small island about 15 miles distant from Puerto Cortez, presumably the one from which an attack is feared.
