HALF POUND

AIRSHIP SO LARGE IT PUZZLED STEAMSHIPS

New York, July 14 .- After a series of conferences with steamship officials and cable dispatches between Thomas Mac-Mechen and Frank S. Lahm in Paris, Mr. MacMechen said last night that word

Mechen and Frank S. Lahm in Paris, Mr. MacMechen said last night that word had been sent to Farman requesting him to ship his big airship with all possible haste to Antwerp and stow it on board the steamer Samland, which will sail from Antwerp for Boston on Thursday. Mr. Lahm has been conducting the ne-sotiations on behalf of Farman for the St. Jouls syndicate which had practically completed all arrangements to bring the successful aeronaut to this country when, at the eleventh hour, it was discovered that on account of its great size the passenger steamers refused to carry the machine. It had been supposed by members of the Aero club here, that the wings of the machine could be folded up and stowed away in a moderate compass. As the cases containing the frame work with the wings are over 45 feet long, inay are too big for the hold and too long for the deck. On advice of the manager of the International Mercantile Marine company, a cable dispatch was sent to Mr. Lahm advising him to bave Farmar's airship sent by the Samland as facilities would be made, it was stat-ed, to have that boat carry the enormous machine. The Samland is due in Boston on July 27, and the first day's flight at Brighton Beach was to Bave been made on July 28. Mr. MacMechen said last inght that he believed the first flight now could hardly be given before July 20, but there will be fights at Brigh-tons just the same, July 20, 31 and Aug. 1. Later there will be flights at Brigh-ton Beach from Aug. 10 to 14.

TWO AUTO ACCIDENTS.

CLEVELAND NATIONAL FOREST.

CLEVELAND NATIONAL FURTH. Washington, July 12.—The San Jacin-to national forest in California will hereafter be known as the Cleveland na-tional forest. It has been so re-chris-taned by President Roosevelt in honor of the late President Cleveland, under whose administration the first national forests were created. In 1897 in honor of Washington's one hundred and sixty-fith birthday and-versary and upon the recommendations of the national academy of sciences. President Cleveland created 13 national forests containing about 22:00:000 acres. The San Jacinto forest was one of the original 13 so created.
