Total receipts were 75,300 cattle, including 11,000 calves, as com-pared with 77,268 head, including 9,500 calves same week last year. Westers calves same week last year. Western steers last week were largely young or thin stuff, not suitable for killers, but the big demand for stockers and feed-ers kept them well cleaned up. The best stockers and feeders closed the best stockers and feeders closed the week a little higher, but bulk of sales were unchanged, and ranged principal-ly from \$2.75 to \$3.40.
