

## MR. ELLIS AT THE THEATRE.

A Large Audience and an Excellent Lecture.

A large audience assembled at the Theatre last evening to hear Mr. Charles Ellis lecture on "The American Government." His subject was handled in the light manner characteristic of the lecturer. He began by defining systematically and politically what the word republican democracy and representative meant. Representative government was well illustrated by the methods adopted in large business corporations, where shareholders nominate and elect directors to certain individual authority to conduct and oversee the business of the concern.

Mr. Ellis then went on to the political division of the country, the geographical and social units, the state, county, state, congressional districts, and finally the Federal government, and showed how each thought represented the other. In conclusion he spoke with all the others. In order to fully illustrate the formation of a state, he gave a historical synopsis of the origin, growth, and development of Prince Edward, a half-breed State of the American Union. He also gave a brief resume of the events which led to the final adoption of the Federal Constitution.

In the course of his lecture Mr. Ellis touched lightly on our civil and the national debt, the war with Mexico, and the causes of other wars. He also dwelt at length on the subject of the bitter and split which legal the American Republic. The chief example of this was the Civil War.

The chief executive of a territory or state was simply "Mr. Governor." The use of the words "legislacy" was entirely redundant. The legislature of a territory or state is nothing more than the people, who are to help in the kitchen or house if they are to right the persons who could turn them out.

It is supposed that the model of government was that of England. Mr. Ellis also dwelt on the fact that the law of God was first taught in Holland when the Dutch Republic was established. Then he turned to England, concerning the persecutions under Philip II, disseminated in that country the principles of the Puritan and Calvinist religion, and this was the model of government ultimately established in our republic.

At the close of the lecture Mr. McGroarty said, "Hail, Times Come Again." Times Come Again. The great orator was introduced by Mr. Ellis as "an old dog—old but loyal—a man who did not sacrifice his principles for the sake of his wife, who was a woman of the world, and who would enter the great theater singing 'Hail, Times Come Again.' No Note." The song was highly appreciated by the audience, and when passed in singing the chorus.

The lecture for next Sunday night was announced as a commentary on America's progress, with special attention to the present Democratic and Republican parties.

Mr. Ellis was suffering from an attack of rheumatism, and was under severe suffering. He made a suggestion to the duty of the preaching election that were received a few days ago. In his closing word to the present legislature brought the house down in great shape. If any of the legislators were present they could not fail to get a smile as to the width of the large audience assembled.

Although the night was extremely cold outside, the Theatre was almost full, and the audience gave the Mr. Ellis, with the Chamberlain Club, a ringing next Sunday night.

## The Growth of the Typewriter.

Fifteen years ago there were not more than 300 stenographers employed in the city of New York, while the growing machines of any kind were scarcely unknown. Today there are 6,000 young men and women who gain a livelihood through the use of the hand writing and the typewriter, and there are probably ten times more persons, mostly young girls, who earn a modest income as copyists by their expertise in the use of the typewriting machine. An additional field of employment has sprung up, and a hitherto undeveloped and mysterious art has become almost a household name. A common school education, the love of reading, and those who can employ a stenographer and win the pen instead of the typewriter in his correspondence is looked upon as old fashioned, and now in his business methods.

At least half a dozen typewriting machines, each capable of doing rapid and acceptable work, have been put upon the market, and the ability to operate one of these machines at a rate of speed has become a skill to be possessed more than the skill of the most expert person. All of this is rapidly becoming to the spirit of the times, which demands the greatest amount of work in the shortest possible time. The correspondence of the business man, while formerly kept him constant to his desk during the greater portion of his business hours, is now disposed of in a few minutes by the aid of a shorthand clerk, while the letters are printed in clear and legible characters, and in much less time than was required when the pen was the only means employed.
