MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Proposition for a License Department to Order That Money Be Saved to the City.

It took the members of the City Council less than an hour to transact their business last night, before adjournment. All the members were present and in their seats before 8 o'clock. Following was the business transacted:

Councilman Lloyd introduced an ordinance, providing for the employment by the city of a collector of licenses and water rates. In support of the measure he stated last night that there were so many delinquents in their payments that it became absolutely necessary for the city to do something. The ordinance is as follows:

It shall be the duty of said collector to collect all manner of license fees and water rates within the city or ordinance as due or to become due and to send bills to the city treasurer before the close of business each day all money collected by him from any source whatever, with a statement in what amount the same belong, and take from said treasurer receipt therefor in duplicate, one of which receipts he shall immediately file with the city auditor, and the other he shall retain in his office. He shall also furnish to said treasurer on the 5th day of each month, of all moneys received and paid out by him, and from whom and on what account said moneys have been received. On the same day he shall furnish to the city auditor a statement in the payment of licenses, to the end that such delinquents may be prosecuted as provided by law.

It was referred to the license committee of which Mr. Lloyd is chairman. Lloyd also introduced an ordinance providing for the letting of a tax on slot machines. Action on this was postponed for one week.

Councilman Clark submitted a communication, intended to be a report of his findings in the matter of H. H. Mead of Spirit, O., who had offered to give the city an ordinance for \$200. The offer was referred to Mr. O'Meara who was to report on the quantity and quality of Mr. Mead's proposition. Mr. O'Meara, in his communication, said that the "Boss of East" would give the city fathers an ordinance for \$200.

Yours of the 23rd instant with reference to my salary as Chief of Police received. I would respectfully state that having been duly appointed, fixed and bonded and being in the discharge of the duties of the office of Chief of Police, I will insist upon the payment of my salary as provided by law.

County Clerk Stanton, submitted a report stating that the county was ready to pay to the city the sum of \$4,000.00 due the city from tax delinquents. As this matter was reported adversely by the city attorney, the question went to the finance committee.

The board of public works recommended the payment of \$250 to contractors, Craig and Anderson, for work done on the new fire station. The recommendation was adopted.

The Salt Lake and Cement Company submitted a claim for \$100 for material furnished the city. Referred to the committee on water works.

D. M. Griffin presented a claim of \$100 for extra work done on his gutter contract. It referred to the board of public works.

Anti-Social John Q. Cannon, in a communication transmits the council, in behalf of the National Guard, for the use of the town on the fourth floor of the post building. After the adoption of the appropriation list, council adjourned.
